**POST-SEASON SERIES IF BREWERS WIN OUT**

Leaders of the American Association Eastern League May Play Off.

Milwaukee, Sept. 10.—If the Brewers win the American Association pennant, will there be a post-season championship series between the winners of the Eastern League and the American Association? That is the question which the league is beginning to ask, now that there seems to be a fighting chance for Milwaukee to land the tag.

In 1906 Buffalo and Columbus played a post-season series, but last season there was nothing doing in that line with Indianapolis.

This year Rochester is apparently going to cop the flag in the Eastern League, and as the two leagues finish the season this year within one day of each other, there does not seem to be any good reason why the series should not be played. In former years, where there was a week or two difference in the closing date, it was a difficult proposition, as it was hard to keep the players together and in condition that idle week. Owner Havenor of the Brewers is hot for a post-season series if his team finishes in the lead and is willing to do the work on rebuilding the park until after a series has been played.

As for the players, they are for it to a man, as it will mean a lot of extra change for them for the winter months.

JOHNSON SHOWS  
HE LACKS PUNCH

Big Negro Demonstrates Little Hitting Power in Kaufman Battle.

WAS NOT IN CONDITION

Champion's Defensive Work, However, Receives Praise From Fight Critics.

New York, Sept. 10.—Several conclusions were reached by sporting men who discussed the Johnson-Kaufman bout today. While Johnson was easily the master of science and point of view it was again clearly shown that he lacks the hitting power that Kaufman's clumsy methods and slothfulness enabled the negro to outclass him with plenty to spare.

But it is a fact that Kaufman has practically no offense and was punched almost at will by Johnson in a majority of the rounds. He was never on the verge of a knockout.

## Negro Just a Boxer.

If Johnson had the punch of Jeffries or Ketchell he probably would have stowed Kaufman away in less than half a dozen rounds. It is thought, but his failure to stop Kaufman or make him take a single count from a knock down, strengthens the opinion of many good judges that the negro is simply a boxer, who does not care for long fights. Kaufman, on the other hand, is strictly a finisher, with endurance and pluck who has no business with a clever man in a short mill.

## Increased His Prestige.

It is safe to predict therefore that having outpointed Kaufman in ten rounds, Johnson will steer clear of a finish fight with the big Californian as long as possible. Johnson has increased his prestige, however, and many ring followers who formerly had a poor opinion of his pugilistic skill, are now ready to give him due credit.

Johnson in a similar bout before the end of the month, but as Barry has been out of the ring for some time, it appears to be a foregone conclusion.

## Will Keep on Training.

Johnson, however, will keep on training and will doubtless be in better condition than he was when he meets Ketchell. The Johnson-Ketchell fight, by the way, will be pulled off regardless of the result of the Ketchell-Langford bout.

When Ketchell and Langford are heard the result of the Johnson-Kaufman fight, he was glad that the negro won, because it meant more interest in Johnson's management, was also well pleased.
