Armature Split and One of the Pumps Is Out of Commission.

The electrical pumps at Springbank have been out of commission all week owing to an accident to one of the motors there. An armature split, putting the whole machinery out of

The Westinghouse Company, who installed the motors, are at work repairing the damage, and it is expected that within a few days the machinery will be ready for use again.

"It is much better that the accident happened before we took the motors over than afterwards," was Superintendent Glaubitz's comment. "We have not accepted the machinery, nor do we intend to do so until we have found everything most satisfactory. We do not want any trouble after we accept them. On Monday last one of the motors broke, tying us up completely for a few days. The damage done is not serious, and can easily be remedied. I did not mention the fact to the newspapers, as I did not consider it our concern. The Westinghouse Company are responsible until we take the machinery over."

SELF DIED FROM WOUNDS IN HEAD DID NOT REGAIN CONSCIOUSNESS

Bullet Has Been Removed From Shoulder of Mrs. Self and the Doctors Are of the Opinion That She Will Recover Unless Complications Set In.

CORONER WILL NOT ORDER AN INQUEST ALL FACTS OF THE CASE ARE KNOWN

Ald. Saunders Secures a Memento of the Tragedy-Family Repudiate a Story Which Is Going the Rounds Today-Curious Visit the Scene.

Nathaniel Self, the bigamist, who shot his wife on Thursday morning about 8 o'clock, at her home at 242 King street, died at Victoria Hospital at four o'clock yesterday afternoon, never regaining consciousness. There was little change in his condition up to 3 p.m. After that he began to show signs of approaching death, and the end came rapidly. No statement of any kind was made by Self. Not after the fatal shot did he utter a syllable, and nothing of his side of the fearful tragecy could be learned.

"When I examined him, it appeared that he had no chance whatever for recovery," said Dr. Shaw, "His brains were oozing out of one of the wounds, and it was apparent that he could not last long."

Dr. Shaw did not attend him after noon, as Dr. Seaborne, of the house staff took charge of the case. He looked after the man as best he could, but nothing would save his life. The skull was fractured, and his brains were shattered. He died of hemorrhage.

"He did not regain consciousness," said Dr. Seaborne. "He died without regaining consciousness."

Mrs. Self is much improved today, and there is every chance in her favor. The only thing to be feared is blood-polsoning. "The facts are very plain," said Dr. Maclaren. "It is a clear case of suicide, and it would be a waste of time and money to hold an inquest. The body is now at the morgue waiting for someone to claim it."
