NONE AVAILABLE ON THAMES RIVER

Abundant Crop Harvested on Ponds and Coves in Suburbs.

Dr. Amyot, Provincial analyst, who isited London a few days ago, and accompanied by Dr. Hutchinson, medical health officer ,inspected the sources of Londons ice supply, written the board of health expressing the opinion that none of the ice should be used for domestic purposes. The communication was read at Tuesday's meeting of the board of health, but no action was taken in the matter.



CITIES MAY USE SURPLUS FROM HYDRO POWER

A new bill introduced at the Ontario egislature by Provincial Secretary Hanna provides that the surplus from all revenues derived from public utili-ties shall form part of the general funds of the corporation.

The clause to this effect read: "The revenues arising from the supplying of any public utility or from the property connected with any public utility works, after providing for the expenses of the maintenance of the works shall, subject to section 31, form part of the general funds of the corporation.
