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

## SAYS CONDITIONS BRITAIN IMPOSED WERE IMPOSSIBLE

Head of German Embassy Issues Statement—Declares They Would Have Kept Navy Bottled Up.

NEW YORK, August 7.—Prior to Germany's attack upon Liege, Sir Edward Grey tried to impose upon Germany conditions which Great Britain could have observed only after a successful war, according to a statement issued here tonight by Daniel von Haimhausen, head of the German Embassy in Washington. In the absence in Europe of Count von Bernstorff, the Ambassador.

These conditions, said Mr. Haimhausen, if accepted by Germany, would have led to absolute inactivity on the part of the German fleet. The statement of the German Charge d'Affaires was prompted, he said, by the nearly complete absence of news from official sources in the Fatherland owing to the present European conditions, including cable censorship.

"It is erroneous to assume," said Mr. Haimhausen, "that the English declaration of war was exclusively caused by Germany's invading Belgium. Negotiations in London had preceded the German attack on Liege. During these negotiations Sir Edward Grey promised that England would remain neutral only under the following conditions:

"First—Germany is not allowed to commit any act of hostility against the French coast in the North Sea.  
"Second—German troops are not allowed to pass through Belgian territory.  
"Third—The German navy is not allowed to attack Russia from the Baltic Sea.

"To the question put by the German Government, whether Great Britain would undertake to respect Belgian neutrality, during the whole war, no answer was given.  
"Sir Edward tried to impose conditions which would have secured to Great Britain without running any risks all the benefits which it could have obtained only by a successful naval war. The acceptance of these conditions would have led to the bottling up of the whole German fleet, forcing it to absolute inactivity.

French Activity.  
"Knowing on the other hand that great numbers of French had crossed the Belgian frontier in about 50 motor cars, rushing up to Liege, which was a flagrant violation of Belgian neutrality, knowing further that Antwerp was the most important harbor ready to open its most important harbor to the British fleet and landing corps, Germany was reluctantly compelled to refuse compliance with the British conditions."

## PORTUGAL IS UNCONDITIONALLY ON BRITISH SIDE, SAYS DECLARATION

London, Aug. 8.—A dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company from Lisbon says that at a special meeting of parliament today the declaration was made that Portugal would place herself unconditionally on the side of England, according to the terms of her ancient treaty. The declaration was received with enthusiastic cheering for France and England.

Premier Machado, in announcing the attitude of the Government, said: "According to our alliance we have duties which we in no way fail to realize." Portuguese warships have been ordered to prepare for a cruise around the coast and foreign shipping in Portuguese ports has been notified to remove its wireless installation. It is reported that the war office has ordered the mobilization of three military divisions.

**GERMANY FOUND OUT.**  
Lisbon, via London, 12:20 p.m.—Portugal's decision to support Great Britain in the general European war was announced today, after Germany had demanded to be informed of her intentions.

## MANY AMERICANS IN WINNIPEG ARE VOLUNTEERING FOR SERVICE

"Don't Care Where You Put Us, So Long As We Get In,"  
They Tell the Recruiting Officer—West Has the War Fever.

Winnipeg, Aug. 8.—Orders have been reached Winnipeg from Ottawa to mobilize 1,500 troops for service with the British army in Belgium.

Last night 50,000 paraded the streets of Winnipeg with great enthusiasm and cheered with great enthusiasm the Cameron Highlanders who marched through the principal streets with full war accoutrements. Bands played patriotic music in the various centres and the words of the music were taken up and sung by the crowds with great feeling.

When the Ninetieth Rifles Regiment, which has seen active service in the field rebellion and South African war, paraded the enthusiasm of the populace reached its height. One favorite song, as interpolated, is, "We'll hang old Kaiser on a sour apple tree."

So far almost every member of every corps in Winnipeg has volunteered for active service, the number being over 4,000. Four infantry regiments in Winnipeg expect to be on full war establishment tonight. In one armory a recruit, when asked what experience he had, stated that he was a first lieutenant in the United States army and showed his papers.

**Americans Volunteer.**  
Quite a large number of United States citizens are existing and all are wanting one thing. "I don't care if I get in the regiment," in many cases these men have been refused.

Military men here think that the first call for 2,500 men from Canada is but a drop in the bucket, and that another will come soon. The same reports of large enlistment come from all points in the West, particularly from Alberta.

## ITALY LOVES FRANCE AND STILL IGNORES GERMANY'S APPEAL

ROME (via Paris), Aug. 7.—The German Government is using its utmost efforts to bring about a change in Italy's attitude in the present European situation. Direct appeals have even been made to King Victor Emmanuel, but all in vain. It is asserted that Italy, having declared her neutrality, intends to maintain it. Italy's position as a member of the Triple Alliance, and, therefore, an ally of Germany under certain conditions, has been discussed in every phase, and the general consensus of opinion seems to be that the Italian people would never permit an act of hostility against France and Great Britain.

## QUEBEC WILL PAY SALARIES TO ALL CIVIC VOLUNTEERS

Council So Decides—Patriotic Songs and Cheers by the Crowds Follow the Announcement.

Quebec, Aug. 8.—The city council last night decided to pay the civic employees who engage in the militia for the present crisis their full salaries.

This decision was taken amid wild enthusiasm. A soldier, who was in the galleries when the decision was given, arose and started to sing "God Save the King." The crowd rose and sang, the aldermen joining, and following the anthem with the French "Marseillaise" and "O Canada."

On their exit from the city hall, the mayor and aldermen were cheered lustily by parading crowds.

**SERVIANS REOCCUPY TOWN OF VISIGRADO**

Nish, Serbia, Aug. 7.—Via London, Aug. 8, 12:40 p.m.—The Austrian troops evacuated Visegrad on the frontier of Novigrad today. The Serbian troops immediately reoccupied the place.

**DIED IN WEST OXFORD**  
Peter Meek Was Successful and Life-Long Resident of District.  
Ingersoll, Aug. 8.—Peter Meek, a life-long resident and one of the best-known farmers of West Oxford, died suddenly at his residence Friday night. Had he lived until today he would have been 74 years old. He had suffered from a weak heart for about a year, but had been greatly improved recently, being around continuously. He was a successful farmer, and 30 years ago had a large sawmill in the vicinity of Folsom's Corners. He leaves a widow, four daughters, Mrs. W. S. Houghton, of Winnipeg; Mrs. J. K. Calder, of Chicago; Mrs. Monty Hegler, and Miss Myrtle, at home, all three sons, Edward, Roy and Vernon, of West Oxford.

**BELGIANS ARE SUSPICIOUS OF DUTCH PEOPLE**  
Their Strict Neutral Attitude Raises Some Thoughts of Sympathy With Germany.  
OBSTRUCTION TO ALLIES  
Prevents Complete Cutting Off of Supplies From the Outside World.  
BRITISH PRESS IS ANGRY  
Correspondents Badly Treated In Germany—Can Send Out No News.

London, Aug. 8.—4:45 a.m.—The qualified admission of a temporary setback to German arms at Liege, which comes from Berlin today, is a reminder of the strict silence generally maintained at the German capital since war was declared.

The only telegraphic outlet by way of Berlin now left is through Amsterdam, and a strict censorship permits only brief dispatches of an official character to leave the country.

The greatest indignation is manifested in the English press at the alleged treatment by the Germans of English correspondents in Berlin, who are endeavoring under the greatest difficulties to serve their papers. The fact that the only news from Berlin now comes through Holland has an interesting phase. Holland is a country in neutrality, is exciting suspicion in Belgium of Dutch sympathy with Germany.

It is contended by the suspicious ones that through the ports of Italy and Holland foodstuffs may still reach Germany and therefore Italian and Dutch neutrality stands in the way of Great Britain. France and Russia completely cutting Germany off from outside supplies.

According to a story told by Dutchmen who returned from Antwerp, and which was given to a London newspaper, the feeling against the Dutch on this account is so strong in Belgium that their lives are unsafe.
