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# IS CZAR'S APPEARANCE AT FRONT SIGN OF SUCCESS?

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Gen. Rennenkampf Has Been Superseded For Coming Too  
Late to Hem In Ger mans, According to  
Correspondent.

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**GRAND DUKE TO COMPLETE PLANS.**

LONDON, Dec. 3.—2:50 a.m.—"The Morning Post's Petrograd correspondent says he hears that the Russian army's winter campaign has been superseded because the weather is making it impossible to take up a position through which the German armies in Poland were to have been hemmed in. This failure, the correspondent says, robbed Grand Duke Nicholas' strategical scheme of its full success a week ago, entailed a week of heavy fighting and resulted in the hurrying up of large German reinforcements."

**GRAND DUKE TO COMPLETE PLANS.**

"The arrival of Emperor Nicholas at the front," the correspondent continues, "will be the occasion for the declaration of the Russian army's intention to complete the plan of the winter campaign."

"The German attack with new forces from the west frontier on the Russian left was repulsed after heavy day-long fighting Monday. The Russian successes on the right wing are not yet so marked, but the strategic position of both sides is secure."

**Desperate Five-Day Battle.**

The Daily Telegraph's Moscow correspondent in a dispatch describing the fighting, says:

"The town was closely besieged by the Germans on three sides, north, east and south. The Russian army was as though it were cut off from the east."

**Germans Lose Thousands.**

"The German army, outfanked and pushed from the rear by the Russians, made supreme efforts to pass by Lodz from the east and the north from the east. The Russian army, however, was able to prevent any such movement, and a severe battle occurred on the outer flank of the German army."

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## DE WET CAPTURED, SAYS OFFICIAL PRETORIA DISPATCH

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Leader of Rebellion in South Africa Taken Prisoner On a Farm—One Son Killed and Two Have  
Surrendered.

PRETORIA, a London, [Canadian Press.]—General Christian De Wet leader of the rebellion in the Union of South Africa, has been taken prisoner according to an official announcement made here. He was captured by Commando Brits last Tuesday on a farm at Waterburg, a town 100 miles east of Mafeking in British Bechuanaland.

Christian De Wet rose to fame as commander-in-chief of the Orange Free State forces in the South African war. Starting as a burglar in the Helshoorn commando, he was appointed commander-in-chief at Ladysmith and was sent to relieve General Cronje as second in command. When General Cronje surrendered, De Wet was made commander-in-chief. He was one of the signatories of the peace congress after the war and later was minister of agriculture in the Orange River colony.

General De Wet at the outbreak of the present war offered a corps of South African scouts to Lord Kitchener. Later he protested against the action of the Union of South Africa in fighting the Germans and took the field against the British forces.

General De Wet has several times been mentioned as meeting with reverses and once as having been wounded. One of his sons was killed in the fighting and two sons are said to have surrendered.
