## TWO CANADIANS IN FIRST 100 AT BISLEY

Emslie of 48th, 51st, and Major Northover of Winnipeg Was 86th.

**BISLEY CAMP, July 11.**—Two Canadians, Sergeant G. M. Emslie of the 48th Highlanders, Toronto, and Major Northover of Winnipeg came 1st and 86th respectively in the Queen Mary prize competition, winning £1 each. Sergeant Emslie is shooting for the first time in the Bisley team. The Queen Mary is a rapid fire, squadded competition, only to past and present members of his majesty's forces. Sergeant Emslie was also first in the 500 yards sweepstakes, and Major F. Richardson of the 16th Canadian Scottish of Victoria, B. C. was second. Major Richardson is a veteran Bisley man.

The Hamilton Leigh challenge cup, open to four present members of his majesty's forces from any one unit, was shot today, and was won by the First Battalion team of the Scots Guards. The distance was 300 yards, the number 10 minute, 15 seconds per shot.

The Birmingham Small Arms School won both the Canadian challenge shield, awarded in connection with the Queen Mary competition and the Cheylesmore rapid firing competition. The Canada shield, worth £75, was donated by the Dominion of Canada, and is open to any number of teams of five present members of his majesty's forces competing in the Queen Mary match from any one unit, the prize going to the unit whose members make the highest aggregate score in the Queen Mary competition.

In the Cheylesmore match, open to teams of four present members of the forces from any one unit, the distance is about 250 yards, and each man shoots 10 shots after covering a course of about 100 yards.

The Braves have the best pitching staff in the National League, he says, adding that with the batting strength of the team they have the elements to get far in this year's race.

Lowell, Mass., July 12.—Henry Sullivan, long-distance swimmer, left here today to make another attempt to swim the English Channel. Three previous efforts by him, made in two years, failed, but in one he was close to the French shore when taken from the water.

## FAN RETURNS BASEBALL.

Boston, July 12.—A package which came by mail to the offices of the Boston National League Baseball Club developed a surprise. It was small and square and was carefully wrapped. The office force stood aside while it was gingerly opened, someone having suggested it might be a bomb. Instead it contained a baseball, apparently one that had been hit into the grandstand by a bleacher and was being returned by a conscientious fan. The sender gave no name or address.

## BALL GAME AT TILBURY.

TILBURY, July 11.—On Thursday afternoon of this week Tilbury and Windsor teams of the Tri-County Baseball League will meet at Memorial Park, Tilbury. A great game is anticipated. Windsor has won three games and lost none to date, while Tilbury has won two and lost one. Windsor has defeated Chatham twice and Chatham has won one to Chatham. ## PARIS LANDMARKS GRADUALLY VANISH

Buildings Crumble Before the March of Business or Wear of Weather.

PARIS, July 11.—Little by little the ancient landmarks of Paris are beginning to disappear, either through the necessity to extend the business centers or the natural wear and tear of the weather. On the Latin Quarter side of the Seine several buildings adjoining the famous Cour de Dragon are being torn down to make way for a modern apartment building. The Grandpre activities of its new-formed "Free Commune," to protect artistic and historic values, gradually is assuming the aspect of a crowded and boisterous district, such as is to be found in any metropolis.

The city fathers of Paris have taken an unusual interest in this problem, and are reported to favor the appointment of a special commission to study what buildings are the most representative of the various epochs of the French capital's history, these to be repaired and restored regardless of cost.

One of the first to be protected will be the ancient Church of St. Eustache, wherein are buried many of France's most able political and religious characters. The interior of this church is in an exceptionally good state of preservation, but the gargoyles overhanging the streets leading to the central markets are being worn away by the weather so fast that architects consider them a menace to pedestrians. Last week a granite statue fell from the top of the church, barely missing passersby in the street, while visitors in the Louvre Gardens are surprised every day by falling chips of stone from the eaves of the former royal palace.

In order to prevent further losses of these old landmarks, it is now reported here that a society known as "Friends of Old Paris" intends asking the government to appropriate 5,000,000 francs to carry on research and protective work.


