Winner of Kitchener-Falls Game To Meet Iroquois Falls Wednesday in Sudden-Death Game.

It is the survival of the fittest in the games for the Allan Cup, emblematic of the amateur hockey championship of Canada. Then they broke into the finals for the John Ross Robertson Cup, and won those games. They will rest up until next Friday, when either Kitchener or Niagara Falls, whichever team wins the intermediate championship, battle Iroquois Falls, the N.O.H.A. title winners on Wednesday night in sudden-death game at the Arena.

Granites will meet the winner of this game on Friday, March 10, and Monday, March 13. If the Curriers win out against Iroquois Falls they will play either Kitchener or Niagara Falls, whichever team wins the intermediate championship, on March 16 and 18 for the right to go into the finals against the winner of the Kitchener-Falls game.

The finals for the Allan Cup will be played March 20 and 22. Six games in thirteen days is some campaign. Granites, or any other team, and if they pull through successful it is proof enough for anybody that they have hockey class and deserve all the honors that they have won.

Always Something Doing.

The visit of the N.O.H.A. champions in quest of the Allan Cup is always of interest to the fans. Two years ago the Sudbury Wolves gave the boys a job when they trampled all over the Collingwood Intermediate O.H.A. champions and then went on and knocked Granites, the senior title holders, for a "roof" in two games. Varsity finally eliminated the Wolves. Last year the Canadian Soo came south, but after heating Galt, they fell easy victims to Varsity. The Iroquois Falls team from the other end of the N.O.H.A. circuit put the quietus on the Wolves. They must have a good team, but how good will be known after they play either Kitchener or Niagara Falls, whichever team wins the intermediate championship. They are sure to give Iroquois Falls a real game.

Fort William May Surprise.

Out west, they do not think that Brandon, who are expected to again represent that part of Canada in the Allan Cup games, are as strong as last season, but that remains to be seen. And then Fort William, who have all the old stars, may surprise this year, may prove a stumbling block to Allan aspirants. Time will tell, but there is every indication that the team will be played at the Arena will surpass those of other years in every way.

The juniors will also hold their position in the limelight, while the seniors are disputing themselves. Aurora Lee and St. Marys will clash in the junior O.H.A. finals Monday and Thursday, and the two games promise stirring battles between well-matched teams.
