

FINE OLD LIQUOR SEIZED BY CROWN IN POLICE COURT

Consignees Did Not Claim
Assortment of Rare Vintages
Shipped by C. N. R.

720 BOTTLES IN ALL

Liquor that would satisfy the taste of any epicure was ordered confiscated by Deputy Magistrate Gladman in police court this morning when persons to whom the liquor was being shipped failed to appear and show cause why it should not be confiscated. The liquor in question, contained in six huge packing cases, was seized at

the C. N. R. depot some days ago by Inspector Thomas Lucas. It was consigned to the Stoney Point Telephone Company. Hugh McDougall of the railway company stated that he knew no reason why it should not be seized, and Chief Stirling stated that a warrant had been sent to the consignee, but that it had been returned, there being no Stoney Point Telephone Company. The magistrate then ordered the liquor confiscated and turned over to the crown in the person of License Inspector Bolton, who will forward it to the government dispensaries, Toronto. The shipment consisted of 120 bottles of Gordon gin, 120 bottles of White Horse, 120 bottles of Black and White, 120 bottles of Old Scotch Whisky, 120 bottles of French wine, including champagne, Benedictine, vermouth, etc.

SAYS MARITIMES NOW ENTERING ON PROSPEROUS ERA

Walter J. Ambrose, the New
Manager of Bank of Mon-
treal, Brings Encouraging
Message.

TRADE IMPROVING

"After passing through the most depressing industrial period of history, the Maritime Provinces are now well on the road to recovery. They turned the economic corner to new prosperity some months ago, and barring unforeseen occurrences, will enjoy better times from now on."

The above is the message from Eastern Canada brought by Walter J. Ambrose, manager of the Bank of Montreal, who assumes his new duties today. Mr. Ambrose arrived from Halifax yesterday, where he was manager of the Bank of Montreal. He succeeds Harvey Skeg here, who has been appointed associate manager of the bank in Winnipeg.

Mr. Ambrose lived in Halifax for the past sixteen months. Before taking over the bank there he was engaged in various capacities throughout the Maritime Provinces. Consequently he has a thorough knowledge of eastern conditions, and is familiar with the many trade and industrial problems which the Atlantic provinces have to face.

Indications that a revival of commerce is on the way are everywhere, Mr. Ambrose said. But the rapidity with which a return to normal is enjoyed depends largely on Europe's ability to reconstruct. The fish trade was largely with European countries and their inability to import fish at the present time is a severe blow to maritime commerce.

In other lines, however, the eastern provinces are gradually improving. The apple crop in the Annapolis Valley will be 3,000,000 barrels this year, the largest in history. The lumber industry is recovering from after-war lethargy and a feeling of optimism prevails.

The Home Bank, Mr. Ambrose said, have no offices in the Maritime Provinces. Consequently no loss was suffered and little uneasiness felt as a result of the defunct institution's failure.

ALBERTA PREPARING TO RELIEVE ONTARIO

Ready To Help Province If
Threatened by Coal
Shortage.

Drumheller, Alta., Aug. 22.—Alberta coal producers will discuss the question of shipping coal to Ontario in case there is a shortage of coal from the United States next winter, when the Red Deer Valley Coal Operators' Association will meet on Thursday, Wilson Gouge, a prominent member of the association, told the Canadian Press last night.

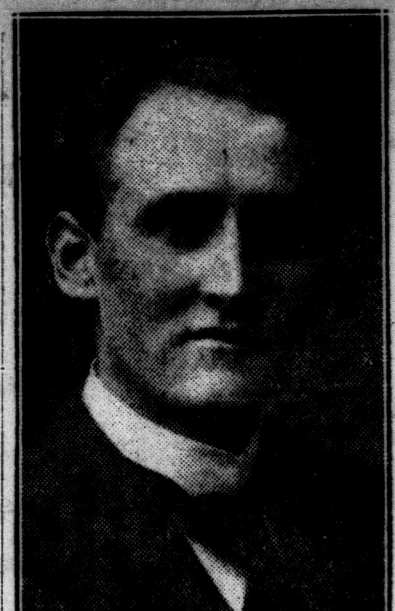
Mr. Gouge said it was probable that plans would be made to cope with the situation in the event of the people of Ontario desiring to ask the west for coal, should the threatened suspension of work in the United States anthracite fields hold up shipments of coal to Canada.

Regarding the question of high freight rates, which would undoubtedly enter into the situation, Mr. Gouge said it was hoped that the Canadian National Railways, in the event of a shortage would see fit to extend the special coal rate. C. P. R. LINER DAMAGED BY STRIKING WRECK

The extent of the damage is unknown as yet but apparently there were no casualties. The vessel is now anchored near Portsmouth, where passengers who were aboard at Hamburg are being landed.

DISMISSES CHARGE AGAINST SARNIA MAN

Police Court Session in Im-
perial City Yields \$400
in Fines.

Sarnia, Aug. 21.—The law tried to get David P. Archer, Napier street, both ways today, but failed under unusual circumstances. Archer, on July 18th, was fined for having liquor in other than a private place, and today he was charged with keeping liquor in a prohibited place under the section of the O. T. A. which says a house is no longer a private dwelling for the purposes of the act when a previous conviction of less than a year stands against the owner. W. S. Haney, defending, held that at the time of the first conviction defendant's home was admittedly a private place, and suggested that the court could not now reverse that definition. The magistrate agreed, and the case was dismissed.

Isaac Williamson pleaded guilty to having liquor in other than a private place, and was fined \$200. James Holling of Plympton township was convicted on a similar offence and fined \$200. The latter decision was in spite of the fact that the jug, containing the evidence had been mysteriously broken while officers were conducting their search.
