Regarding the question of high reight rates, which would undoubt edly enter into the situation, Mr. Gouge said it was hoped that the Canadian National Railways, in the event of a shortage would see fit to extend the special coal rate to On-tario made by Sir Henry Thornton for the summer months only.

Mr. Keyes is 81 years of age, and lived alone.


