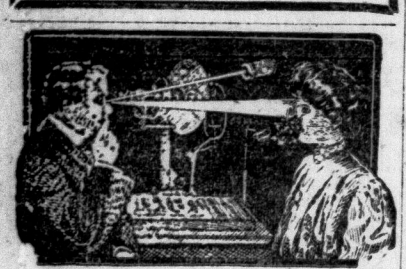

PLEADS PENSION FOR DISMISSED POSTAL VETERAN

Labor Member Tells Parliament Civil Servant Dismissed Without Cause.

MINISTER EXPLAINS

Premier King Promises Fair Play To Men Charged With Theft.

Ottawa, April 11.—On a motion to go into supply in the House of Commons yesterday, William Irvine, Labor member for East Calgary, drew the attention of the house to the case of John J. Hayes, who had been in the employ of the postoffice department for 33 years, but who, it was claimed, had been dismissed without justification.

The postmaster of Calgary apparently was opposed to Mr. Hayes, said the speaker, and a trap was "framed up to catch him." Mr. Hayes had been arrested.

For some reason or other Mr. Hayes had been denied the right to trial by jury, said Mr. Irvine, and the judge before whom he was taken found him guilty. Appeal was taken to a higher court, which quashed the conviction because the evidence was insufficient. Mr. Hayes was then set free. Later he was informed that an order-in-council had been passed discharging him. Mr. Hayes automatically lost his pension on discharge. Mr. Irvine contended that Mr. Hayes should have paid his wages either until he was reinstated or his pension granted.

Moves For Redress.
Mr. Irvine moved, seconded by Captain J. T. Shaw, West Calgary, that the House record its opinion that the dismissal of Mr. Hayes was wholly unjust and that immediate steps should be taken to redress the injury done to him.

Hon. George P. Graham, acting Postmaster General, said he did not want to hurt the feelings of Mr. Hayes. The resolution was not doing him any kindness. It would have been better had the mover and seconder taken the matter up personally with the head of the department.

The Minister outlined the steps which had been taken in the case. Hayes was charged with stealing two letters, one containing two marked one dollar bills.

Questions For Trust.
Mr. Graham asked if any member of the House would continue to trust a public servant under such circumstances.

Robert Forke agreed with Mr. Meighen that the department could not keep any man in the public service who was under the slightest suspicion. He hoped that something would be done to give the man his pension.

Premier King said that the department would have been remiss in its duty if it had not dismissed Hayes. He suggested that the resolution be withdrawn because the government would see that the fullest possible justice was done to the man.

The motion was then withdrawn.

INTENSIFY FLOWER PERFUME BY GRAFTS

Interesting Horticultural Experiments Reported In France Open New Field.

Paris, April 11.—Interesting steps in the perfume of flowers is the latest horticultural experiment in France. Results achieved by Professor Daniel of the University of Rennes were presented here Monday before the Academy of Sciences, and declared to open up a new field allowing hitherto undreamed-of possibilities for perfume makers.

By grafting a shoot of wormwood on a chrysanthemum it was found the odor of the chrysanthemum was greatly intensified. From the seeds of the graft splendid plants were obtained the following year which produced flowers. Some of the blossoms had powerful perfume, but others were entirely odorless.

Although the experimentation admittedly is in its infancy, it is generally agreed this new horticultural wrinkle is capable of tremendous results from a commercial standpoint and for that reason it is to be tried on a great scale at Grasse, the centre of the perfume industry of France. All perfume-making flowers will be grafted with shoots of various plants in an effort to determine what species play the role of intensifiers.

HAS NO INDICATION THAT VIEWS CLASH

British Government Unaware That America Disagrees On Ruhr Question.

London, April 11.—The British Government has no indication that the United States Government does not share its views that intervention in the Ruhr question would serve no useful purpose at the moment, it was stated by Ronald McNeill, under secretary for foreign affairs, in the House of Commons yesterday afternoon.

"The statement was in answer to a question whether the British Government was in complete accord with the United States policy regarding the possibility and desirability of intervention."

PAY FINAL TRIBUTE TO MRS. A. KENNEDY

Guelph Citizens Gather At Bier of London Woman.

Guelph, April 11.—The funeral of Mrs. Anna M. Kennedy of London, formerly a popular resident of this city, was held yesterday morning from the Church of Our Lady to the Roman Catholic cemetery.

Mrs. Kennedy died in St. Joseph's Hospital, London, on Saturday night of pneumonia following influenza. Seldom has the church held such a large and sorrowful congregation. Mrs. Kennedy was greatly beloved by old and young, and they came in hundreds to pay their last respects to one who always had a cheery way and a bright, friendly smile for them.

Solemn high mass was sung by Rev. Fr. Joseph Kennedy, C.S.B., of Sandwich, Ont., a brother-in-law of Mrs. Kennedy, assisted by Rev. Fr. Doyle as deacon and Fr. Primeau as sub-deacon, after which the casket was opened at the church door in order that her many friends might gaze for the last time on the face they loved so well.

Mrs. Kennedy taught singing in the separate schools here until the separate schools and Loretto convent were present at the funeral, as were the members of the Sodality of the Children of Mary. At the close of the Mass, Albert E. Kaiser sang "The Dying Christian." The pallbearers were Jos. Cartledge, Matthew Kelly, John Dooley, Frank Howard, E. B. Clancy and Joseph Harris.

IRISH REBEL CHIEFTAIN SUCCEUMBS TO WOUNDS

Liam Lynch Captured After Fight With Free State Troops.

Dublin, April 11.—Liam Lynch, chief of staff of the irregular forces, wounded and captured by Free State troops yesterday morning, died at 8:45 o'clock last night.

The death of Liam Lynch is regarded here as heralding the final collapse of the irregulars. Lynch was the "chief of staff" of the irregular military organization, and a dominant figure in its circles. He had a powerful influence over Eamon de Valera, with whom he worked in concert. Both men signed all important decisions and virtually constituted the republican directorate.

When gasses were caused by the capture of his men, Lynch always was able promptly to fill their places.

His assistant was Liam Deasy, who, after he was arrested some time ago and the death sentence imposed upon him, issued an appeal for peace. Deasy's place was filled by Con Mooney, who since has been captured. Lynch then found the man of his own temper to take Mooney's place, and both Lynch and his man voted at the recent army meeting against the peace proposals of the Most Rev. John Harty, Archbishop of Cashel.

In the fighting against the British, Lynch and Deasy were chief assistants and close friends of the late Michael Collins. Later, however, Collins was unable to persuade them to accept the Anglo-Irish treaty. Lynch was captured during the fight at the Four Courts Building in Dublin in June of last year, but was released, it is alleged, on parole, which he broke.

IDENTIFY DEAD MAN.

Windsor, April 10.—Identification of the body of a man found dead in a buggy on Huron Line, Sandwich West township, on Monday has been established as that of Henry Carey, 74, a farmer of Sandwich. Heart disease is believed to have been the cause of death.

LABOR ESTIMATES ARE RATIFIED BY PARLIAMENT

Minister of Labor Counters Twits of Meighen On Waste Contract.

CONSIDERS ANNUITIES

Government Declines To Investigate British Empire Steel Corporation.

Ottawa, April 11.—Remaining labor estimates went through the House last night. During the day, discussion on the items ran from government annuities to the Labor Gazette, from the Cape Breton strike to waste paper contracts, and the Moosejaw election. J. S. Woodsworth, Labor member for Centre Winnipeg, was anxious to know if the government could not, in connection with the Cape Breton troubles, hold a thorough investigation into the British Empire Steel Corporation.

Hon. James Murdock, Minister of Labor, could not see how the Labor department could step in. If employers and labor went round with a chip on their shoulder and refused to discuss a settlement, the department could do nothing. On a waste paper contract, Mr. Meighen, leader of the Opposition, twitted Mr. Murdock over his part in the Moosejaw election.

"While we are talking about waste," drily remarked Mr. Meighen, as the House laughed, "will the Minister explain how he came to waste time, going to the Moosejaw election and came back without being allowed to speak."

"I took my holidays out there instead of going to Atlantic City," Mr. Murdock retorted, and the House laughed again.

Duty Called Him.
Mr. Murdock subsequently explained that he had come back from Moosejaw without speaking because his estimates were due to come up in the House.

"It wasn't the coming back I marvelled at," rejoined Mr. Meighen. "It was the going out."

When the labor estimates were taken up in the House the matter of annuities came under discussion. Hon. W. S. Fielding, minister of finance, said the question of increasing the interest rate to annuitants to five per cent had been taken up a year ago, and it was then felt that the increase would not be wise. The annuities scheme was not a matter of making profit. If the government could give safety without too much cost, that was what was required.

Sir Henry Drayton, before the scheme would do much better if ordinary actuarial methods were applied to it. The government should be able to do better than the insurance companies in this, but it was not doing so and could not expect to do very much under present conditions. He believed the interest on short date annuities could be increased to five per cent.

Mr. Boys (S. Simcoe) also expressed the opinion that the government would consider this. Mr. Fielding said further consideration would be given and before the end of the session it would be seen whether or not an increase to five per cent could not be made.

Discussion then turned to the cost of living figures issued by the department. Hon. J. Murdock, minister of labor, said in December 1921 when the present government took office the cost of the average family budget was sixty two points higher than the normal 1913 figures. In April 1922 that was reduced to 52 points higher than the normal. In December, when it became 53, January 1923, 54, February 54 and March 55. This Mr. Murdock said was the customary winter increase.

Sir Henry Drayton said there had been a regular toboggan slide of prices from 1920 until "My Liberal friends got fairly into the saddle and to work."

He asked Mr. Murdock what had caused the increase.

Mr. Murdock said there was no great change. After July 1920 wages and prices had been shortly reduced, but towards normal and 1921 found them crossing the line 56 points above the 1913 normal figures.

Vote Salaries.
The vote of \$231,735 for salaries and \$16,500 for contingencies in the department of labor was then carried.

The committees then took up an item of \$55,000 for the Industrial Disputes Investigation Act.

J. S. Woodsworth (Labor, Centre Winnipeg) suggested broadening the scope of the Act so as to include certain municipal organizations which now did not come under the Act.

Hon. James Murdock said that he America act precluded the British North America act. He said that the industrial disputes act to such municipal organizations.

Mr. Woodsworth then asked if it was not possible to apply the act, or amend it so that it could be applied to the situation in the Cape Breton coal and steel district. Demonstrations between the British Empire Steel Corporation and its employees were becoming strained. The responsibility of initiating legislation which would prevent violence in this field rested with the federal authorities.

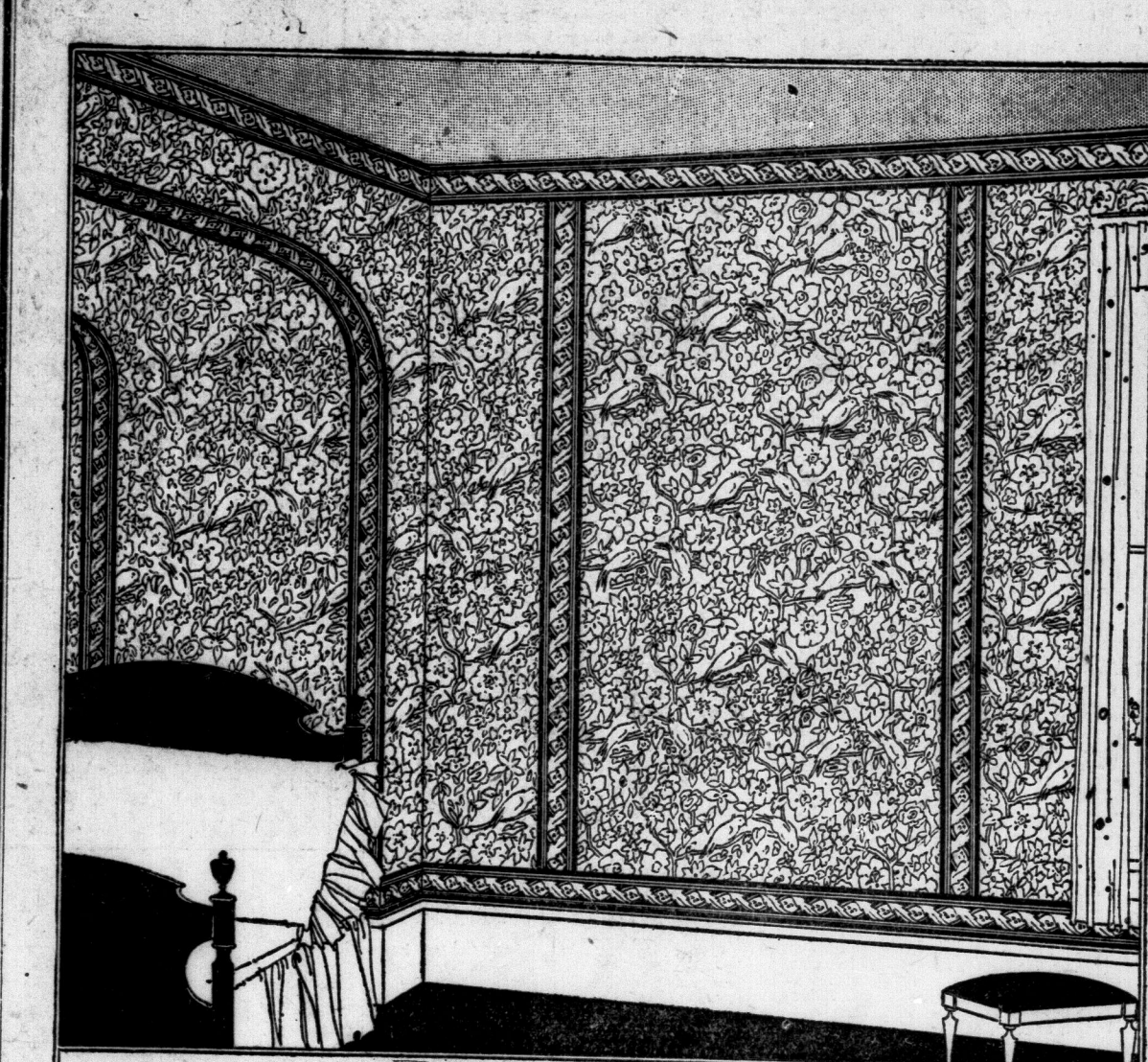
Unique Situation.

Montreal, April 11.—Methods of calculation in connection with the pari-mutuel system of betting at horse-races was minutely explained in the court of King's Bench, when the case against Frank H. Dunn, charged with falsifying returns and the provincial government as a race track official, was started. For several hours J. B. Watson, auditor of the Connaught Park Jockey Club, was on the witness stand, telling Mr. Justice Wilson and the members of the jury how the bettings are totaled after each race, and how the percentages to the club and government are divided.

The witness explained that 10 per cent of a pool after a race is taken at once; of this, 7 per cent goes to the jockey club, providing the pool totals less than \$20,000. If it is over that amount up to \$30,000 the club takes 6 per cent; 5 per cent if between \$30,000 and \$40,000. Three per cent goes to the provincial government, but the "break" or the "breakage" of odd cents is added to the receipts of the jockey club. The total "breakage," Mr. Watson said, was \$1,200 in one season.
