LEGAL RECIPROCITY CALLED POSSIBLE

International Efforts Made To Indemnify Canadian Motorists in Tourist Crashes.

PROBLEM PUZZLES

An international effort will soon be made to provide improved legal machinery to indemnify Canadian motorists following crashes between Canadian and American cars in Canadian territory. The secretary of the London motor club points out that if a native of Ontario gets into a smash with an American car, he has no legal redress unless the car from the U. S. is caught before it reaches the border.

"Because of this unfair position," he says, "the Ontario motor league, in the persons of Oliver Hezzlewood. notorists following crashes between

Through their efforts it was decided to refer the matter to the American automobile association, with an urgent rec ommendation that it do all in its power to co-operate with the Ontario

motor league in finding a solution for the problem.

Compulsory Insurance. Compulsory insurance was suggested, but discarded on the ground that recovery of damages would be difficult in cases where tourists from a distance were insured in local companies. Another suggestion was that the Ontario government compel every motorist entering the province to take out a bond or make a sub-stantial cash deposit to insure the indemnification of anyone hurt in an accident. This also was turned down, the reason being that with American tourist traffic forming such a large part of the revenue of the province, it would be an impolitic move and not producive of the results desired. 


