Off Flattery a liner was sighted and thence nothing was seen until the smoke of a Japanese gunboat was noted curling skyward one hazy day in Tsuruga straits.

Capt. Watson essayed the passage of La Perouse' strait, which leads from the Sea of Okhotsk to the Sea of Japan and the Bay of Peter the Great, where lies Vladivostok. This water between the islands of Saghallen and Yezo, or Hokaido, the northernmost portion of Japan, was found to be frozen, and the Wyefield was caught for two days in thick fields of drift ice. One piece driven against the blow plates of the steamer caused injuries which resulted in a leak, necessitating the pumps being brought into use. Unable to get through La Perouse straits, Capt. Watson steered again to the Sea of Okhotsk and rounded Hokkaido into Tsuruga or Sangar straits, between the island of Hokkaido and the main island of Japan.

WONDERFUL SILK OF SPIDER.

The astronomer after the experience of many years has found that the spider furnishes the only thread which can be successfully used in carrying on his work, writes Ambrose Swazey, in the Scientific American.

The spider lines mostly used are from one-fifth to one-seventh of a thousandth of an inch in diameter, and, in addition to their strength and elasticity, they have the peculiar property of withstanding great changes of temperature; and often when measuring the sun spots, although the heat is so intense as to crack the lenses of the micrometer eyepiece, yet the spider lines are not in the least injured.
