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NO MORE NICKEL LAND AT \$2.

THE GOVERNMENT SHUTS DOWN ON THE REPRODUCTION.

A Sudden Withdrawal of the Valuable

Yates in the Sudbury District Causes Consideration Among the Crown Lands Department as to the Future of the Interest in the Government.

There will be no more nickel lands at \$2 per acre.

Such was the startling information that awaited the mining brokers and speculators who found their way to the Crown Lands Department on Saturday afternoon.

"We cannot receive any further applications, nor will those who have not paid the money on previous allotments receive any more lands."

Mr. Aubrey said, the deputy commissioner, to all comers.

"What is the reason?" was anxiously asked.

"Oh! there is no reason," was the unambiguous rejoinder.

After Hon. A. S. Hardy, the commissioner, had imparted the decision of the Government to withdraw all the lands in the Sudbury district from the market for its deputy

mining brokers had half-desperately clamored on hand anxiously sought out Little Thunders, but while they were looking for him he was

The news that these lands had been withdrawn spread quickly among the mining brokers and speculators, and before evening it was the single theme among them.

It is also said that either as individuals or as syndicates reformers make up the bulk of the applicants. Those of them who got their applications accepted are jubilant; those who failed are incensed that the Government didn't make the notice longer.

The matter before the Government has several precedents. It is learned, however, that several sections lately at which the subject was warmly discussed. 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PARNELL'S PRIDE OF POWER.

LIKELY TO HAVE A GREAT FALL AT 20-DAYS MEETING.

No Probability That the Unworn King

Will be Crowned with a Garland of Fig Leaves—Gladstone's Counter Manifesto—Dillon and O'Brien Call for Their Leader's Retirement.

LONDON, Nov. 30.—Parnell's unusual demeanor while in the parliament building to-day, his inability to attend the meeting of the Cork branch of the National League, and the uncertainty of his position, opinions gathered at the National Liberal Club, the result of the anti-Parnell section of the Irish party, are that Parnell's manifesto will have no perceptible effect upon his support.

At a meeting of the Cork branch of the National League, which was held at the residence of Mr. Parnell, the manifesto was read and discussed.

The Irish party met in the Parliament buildings this afternoon. Parnell was not present. Nothing was done, and the meeting was adjourned to Monday.

The Cork branch held a meeting to-day to consider the situation and adoption of a manifesto declaring that Parnell had forfeited his confidence, and that his retention in the leadership would prove disastrous.
