OBITUARY

A very sad event occurred on Thursday, Dec. 26th,1912,in the death of Alexander D. McIntosh, eldest son of Mr. and and Mrs. Geo. McIntosh, of the 6th line of Enniskillen, which took place in the hospital at the American Soo, after an illness of only one week. In his early years deceased suffered from poor health, but during the last five years in which he had made his home at the Soo he had enjoyed the best of health until the illness which resulted in his death. Deceased was just in his twenty-sixth year and being possessed of a remarkable energy, ability and ambition, he had a bright future before him, and it seems hard that a bright young life should go out on the threshold of its usefulness. Although naturally of a very quiet and retiring disposition, he made many friends and no man ever left Enniskillen who was more generally liked for his many good qualities. The remains arrived in Petrolea on Tuesday afternoon, Dec. 31, accompanied by his cousin, Mr. Will Harrison, of the Soo, and were taken

to his father's home in Enniskillen. The funeral, which was largely attended, took place on Thursday morning, January 2nd, 1913, from his home to the Arkona cemetery. 
