VERY LATEST EUROPEAN NEWS.—The American squadron under Commodore Perry arrived at Japan on the 8th July, and departed again on the 17th. They were well received. Japan has promised to open a trade with the Americans next Spring.

On the 21st ult. a large reform meeting was held at Victoria, in the County of Kent, in honor of Mr. G. Brown. A ship that arrived from Liverpool at Quebec had 20 cases of cholera on board. She was towed back to quarantine at Gross Isle.
