BURSARIES will be awarded at the opening of the next Session of Knox's College, according to the following Scheme:—

1.—For the best examination in the Grammar of the English Language, open to all entrants, £2 10*s*.

2.—For the best examination in the Grammar of the Latin Language, open to all entrants, £2 10*s*.

3.—For the best examination in the Grammar of the Greek Language, open to all entrants, £2 10*s*.

4.—The George Buchanan Bursary of £10, (founded by George Buchanan, Esq.) for eminence in Latin and Greek, as proved by examination in the Grammar of both Languages. Livy Book 1, 30 chapters; Herodotus, 3 & 4 Book of Odes; Xenophon's Memorab. Collect., Mai Book 1st, chaps. 2, 3, 4; Herodotus—Pisistratus and Cyrus, in Collect. Major. Iliad, Book 3, 200 lines; Roman Antiquities.
