COMMERCIAL.

FLOUR GRAIN, Etc.

Flour.—In Spring wheat flour, sales are reported as low as \$4 for round lots of City bakers, and we quote \$4 to \$4.15 as to quality. Manitoba ground strong bakers has sold at \$3 75 to \$4, down to \$3.50 for the common grades. Flour is still going forward to England.

Oats.—Sale are reported at 33c to 33 1/2c per 31 lbs. for No. 2 Ontario in store here, but sales have also been made of No. 2 Quebec at 32 1/2c. Barley.—We quote feed barley 37c to 44c, and mailing grades 48c to 55c, although higher figures are asked.

PROVISIONS.

Pork, Lard &c.—Chicago new mess pork is quoted firm at \$15.50, and sales of Canada short cut mess are reported at \$16.25 to \$16.50 in good sized lots, single barrels \$17.00.

DAIRY PRODUCE.

Butter.—Several lots of August creamery have been placed at 22 1/2c, and one choice lot at 21c. Early makes, 21c to 22c. In Eastern Townships dairy, higher prices it is said are paid in the country than can be had for it here.

Creamery choice fall. 23 1/2c to 24c. do good to fine. 21c to 22c. Eastern Township dairy, choice fall. 20c to 21c. do do good to fine. 18 1/2c to 19 1/2c.

COUNTRY PRODUCE.

Eggs.—Held eggs have sold at 13c to 13 1/2c. The English market is firm with offers at 7 1/2 c. i. f. for fine stock.

FRUITS.

Apples.—Sales have been made of car lots at \$1.50 to \$1.70, as to quality, choice fall fruit being quoted at \$1.75 to \$2.00.

FISH AND OILS.

Pickled Fish.—Dry cod is very slow, the few sales reported being at about \$5 per quintal. Green cod only a scattered sale or two are reported at about and \$4.50 for No. 1, and \$5 for large, receipts and demand being both light.
