Concluding Remarks:

This article has explored the transition in Canadian foreign policy from peacekeeping to peacebuilding, and from national security to human security based on a case study of the CPDD in Israel/Palestine and Jordan. Fieldwork in these areas in the year 2000 revealed a series of challenges and opportunities related to the CPDD in terms of its mandate, administration, and concrete experiences of the participants. While many of the projects have been successful in fulfilling their stated objectives, there continue to be concerns about the viability of such projects during a period in which the peace negotiators have consistently failed and public opinion in Israel, Palestine, and Jordan has turned more wary of inter-ethnic dialogue. While the experience of peacebuilding and human security are positive and essential to the establishment of peaceful relations between peoples
