of Canada will do well to see to it that they get the whole of that home market for themselves, but they cannot get it unless they are protected against foreign countries dumping their butter, cheese and other farm products into Canada. The time has come for the farmers of Canada to take a definite stand on this question, and I hope hon.

members opposite will take that stand and take it soon.

I have here a statement compiled from figures of the Trade and Commerce department with respect to imports into Canada from the United States during the first eight months of 1925, showing quantities, value and duty paid.
