INQUIRY AS TO ARMS TO BE PROVIDED TO ARMED FORCES

Hon. Paul Martineau (Pontiac-Temiscamingue): Mr. Speaker, I have a question for the Minister of National Defence. For the benefit of the house I would like him to define what is meant by the "modern arms weapons" that are to be made available for the Canadian armed forces?

Inquiries of the Ministry

Hon. Paul Hellyer (Minister of National Defence): Mr. Speaker, the answer to this question would be extremely long and involved, and in view of the fact that a resolution will be introduced shortly to set up a special select committee on defence problems I think that would be the best time to discuss these matters in detail.

Mr. Gerard Chapdelaine (Sherbrooke): Mr. Speaker, I should like to address a question to the Prime Minister.

Could the Prime Minister tell us if he is aware of the fact that it will cost the Canadian taxpayers \$1 billion to equip the Bomarcs with nuclear warheads?

Right Hon. L. B. Pearson (Prime Minister): Mr. Speaker, I am aware of no such fact, because no such fact exists.

Right Hon. L. B. Pearson (Prime Minister): Mr. Speaker, the whole question of defence policy is under consideration by the government and it will soon be under consideration, I hope, by a select committee of this house.

Mr. Olson: A supplementary question, Mr. Speaker. When can we expect this committee to be set up?

Mr. Pearson: At the very earliest possible date, Mr. Speaker, the house will be given a chance to deal with this matter through a resolution.

Mr. Georges Valade (St. Mary): Mr. Speaker, I have a question for the Prime Minister. Since I know that he is quite bilingual, will he give himself the pleasure of answering me in French. My question arises from a statement made by the Minister of National Defence, when he said that parliament did not have to be consulted in order to equip our armed forces with nuclear warheads. I would ask the Prime Minister whether he shares that point of view.

Right Hon. L. B. Pearson (Prime Minister): Mr. Speaker, the Minister of National Defence did not make the statement attributed to him by my hon. friend. However, I have already said, and the Minister of National Defence agrees with me, that this whole question of
