ALLEGATION OF EXCESSIVE PROFITS BY FOOD CHAINS— GOVERNMENT ACTION

ESTABLISHMENT OF HELICOPTER FORCE AND USE OF AMATEUR RADIO OPERATORS FOR COMMUNICATING WITH STRICKEN COUNTRIES

Mr. Donald W. Munro (Esquimalt-Saanich): Mr. Speaker, before addressing my question to the Secretary of State for External Affairs I hope I might be allowed to pay tribute to those dedicated and courteous public servants in the consular division of the Department of External Affairs, as well as in Guatemala for their tireless efforts to locate Canadians missing in Guatemala and to reassure worried relatives in Canada.

Some hon. Members: Hear, hear!

Mr. Munro (Esquimalt-Saanich): My question is this: in order to avoid a recurrence of some of the communications problems which revealed themselves during the earthquake disaster, has the government taken any steps to set up a standing emergency helicopter force which might fly to stricken countries in case of need in order to improve internal communications in such circumstances. Also, has any effort been made to enlist the support of Canadian ham radio operators so as to improve communications between Canada and stricken countries? I know ham radio operators are ready, willing and able to co-operate.

Hon. Allan J. MacEachen (Secretary of State for External Affairs): As to the first point, the hon. member made a constructive suggestion recently that we might make a helicopter, or a number of helicopters, available to the Guatemalan authorities. We investigated that proposal and found that in the circumstances the airport facilities in Guatemala could not service more helicopters than were in use at that particular time. Therefore any contribution that we might be willing to make would, in the circumstances, be redundant.
