All the waggons to be drawn up to-morrow morning as close as possible and as soon as the waggons belong to the detachment under the command sof Majr Chapman have closed up to the rear of the Artillery that Detachment then to join the respective Corps.

Col Dunbars Regiment to encamp to morrow morning upon the left of the whole, according to the line of Encampment.
