Top Figures Reached Not Fully Maintained-Not Considered Menace.

CHICAGO, May 28.—Discovery of black rust in Oklahoma carried wheat today up to \$1 a bushel, May delivery the highest price of the crop year. There was a nervous feeling at the closs which was ¼ to %c above last night Corn finished %c off, to %c up, oats a hade to 1%c down, and provisions a 1% to 22½ decline.

News of the finding of black rust pores on Oklahoma wheat came after rices had responded in a moderate derect to reports of damage from wind and rain in Texas and Oklahoma. The mige to \$1 for May was accompanied by exciting buying of new crop months. The top figures reached, however, were of fully maintained, as black rust has arely been a menace to winter wheat except where the season has been late mough for a third cycle of spores to develop.

Tightness in the May option was emhasized by the chartering of vessel com for 1,000,000 bushels to be shipped from here to Georgian Bay and Montal. There is but one more day for May contracts to run and some gossipms indulged in as to the chances of an eleventh-hour flurry among shorts.

Congestion Ends.

In corn congestion the May delivery tave signs of being at an end. Besides there were reports that Argentine damine had been exaggerated. Showers favoring a good start for the domestic crop tended also to offset the bullish influence of wheat strength. Country offerings, tho, were small.

Relief from drought complaints permitted an easier feeling in regard to eats. May broke almost 2 cents at one time, but raillied toward the last.

Liquidating sales by packers lowered the provision market all around, Shorts bought on the decline.

FIREMEN OVERCOME AT DETROIT STATION

Thirty Thousand Dollars' Damage Done by Flames in Depot.

Canadian Press Despatch.

DETROIT, May 28.—More than fifty firemen were overcome by smoke and ten partly conscious foreigners were dragged to safety from the flames which swept the basement of the Fort Street Union Station here last night. The fire, one of the most stubborn in the history of Detroit, was not completely extinguished until early today. The cause has not been determined, but it started in a room in the basement where records were kept. The loss is estimated at \$30.000. The firemen confined the flames to the basement. The station is used by the Wabash. Pere Marquette and Canadian Pacific Railroads. The old Michigan Central Station, a short distance away, recently was destroyed by fire.
