

NAVAL BATTLE SOON IS COMING

British-Japanese Squadron to Meet Germans off South America.

SIX GERMAN CRUISERS

Number of Ships in British Squadron is Not Known.

LONDON, Dec. 4.—The Admiralty and the British fleet have received orders by cable from England to cancel all sailings from this port until December 15. This is the latest development in regard to the expected naval engagement between fleets of Germany and England and her allies off the Atlantic coast of South America.

Both of the fleets believed to be preparing for a naval action off the coast of Uruguay or Argentina, which will undoubtedly be fought to a decisive result, are believed to have been reinforced.

Admiral Von Spee, who commanded the fleet that defeated the British squadron off Coronel, Chile, on Nov. 1, is now thought to have under his command the battle cruiser Von Der Thann. This would give him the following strength, with eight effective fighting vessels: Von Der Thann, battle cruiser, 28 knots, eight 11-inch, ten 6-inch and sixteen 4-pound guns, 18,700 tons; Scharnhorst, armored cruiser, 22 knots, eight 8.5-inch, six 5.9-inch and sixteen 4-pound guns, 11,450 tons; Nürnberg, third-class cruiser, 21.5 knots, ten 4.1-inch, eight 2.1-inch guns, four machine guns, 3,598 tons; Leipzig, third-class cruiser, 23 knots, ten 4.1-inch and fourteen machine guns, 3,200 tons; Dresden, third-class cruiser, 27 knots, twelve 4.1-inch, two machine guns, 4,500 tons; Karlsruhe, third-class cruiser, 27 knots, twelve 4.1-inch and two machine guns, 4,520 tons.

The strength of the British fleet is not known. The Invincible, which is reported from Montevideo to have joined the fleet, is a battle cruiser only four years old, with a tonnage displacement of 17,250 and batteries consisting of eight 12-inch, sixteen 4-inch and five smaller guns.

If the Japanese navy has contributed to the force which is seeking the Germans, the strength of the allied fleet is indeterminate. It is not beyond possibility that cruisers from Australian and Russian Pacific fleets which aided in the search for the Emden and Koelnburg, have rounded Cape Horn.

The extension sought for the Athabasca, Northern Railway Co. and the Moncton and Northumberland Strait Railway Co. The Canadian Northern Railway Co. seeks confirmation of an agreement between the Campbellford, Lake Ontario and Western Railway Co. and the Canadian Northern Ontario Railway Co., respecting the terminal at Belleville, also confirming an agreement between the Georgian Bay and Seaboard Railway Co. and the Canadian Northern Ontario Railway Co., respecting joint trains and terminals at Orillia.

The Toronto, Hamilton and Buffalo Railway Co. seeks confirmation of the amalgamation of that company with the Erie and Ontario Railway Co.

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SOLDIERS PREPARE FOR PREMIER'S CALL

Strength of New Units Being Mobilized Here Has Been Announced.

MEN STOOD TEST WELL

In Spite of Inoculation, Soldiers at Exhibition Appeared in Good Condition

Sir Robert Borden, premier of Canada, will make an inspection of the camp of the second contingent at the exhibition grounds this morning. The officers of the regiments will stand outside the buildings occupied by their troops, to meet the premier and party. The fact that the men of the two infantry battalions were able to march over twenty miles yesterday is cited as good proof of the fitness in which the soldiers have stood the recent inoculation against typhoid. The 19th and 20th Battalions, numbering 3,000 troops, carried out operations during the morning in the vicinity of High Park, the manoeuvring including the main portion of the training the men have had laid down for them in camp. Major-General F. L. Lessard and Lieut.-Col. H. M. Elliott witnessed the proceedings. The troops followed out a scheme previously mapped out by Major H. C. Bickford. The infantry of the 10th Battalion, under command of Lieut.-Col. J. R. McLaren, were to attempt to invade the city from the west, with their northern boundary at Bloor and Lake Shore roads as their southern boundary.

The Defending Force. The 20th Battalion, under command of Lieut.-Col. J. A. W. Allan, constituted the defending force. The men of the 19th were distinguished from the defending force by white bands around their hats. The men of each battalion think they constituted the successful side. Until the officers in command published a report, the result is in doubt.

The two battalions were back at the camp in the afternoon and appeared to be going thru the regular battalion and company drill with the same spirit and alertness as usual. The manoeuvres in High Park had not tired them. Detachments for the camp from western Canada will arrive in camp at the Fair grounds today and tomorrow. During today two officers and 25 men are expected from Vancouver and tomorrow afternoon one officer and 50 men from Calgary. Both of these detachments are part of the Army Service Corps. Lieut. C. G. McKinnon of Montreal and Lieut. I. C. Ellard of Ottawa, both of the A. S. C. arrived yesterday.

Newspapers' Mistake

Orders posted at the camp yesterday show that seventeen more men have been struck off an account of being medically unfit, also one discharged for refusing to be inoculated and one as being undesirable. A curious error was made by an evening paper yesterday which said six "drivers" had been stricken from the strength on this account in reality they were "drivers."

The strength of the new units now being mobilized here for the second contingent is given in the summary posted yesterday at the camp. Army Headquarters Field Artillery will have 28 officers, 38 other ranks, total 45, and 38 horses; the ammunition column of the Field Artillery Brigade will have 1 officer, 53 in ranks, total 54; the No. 2 section division ammunition column will have 1 officer, 78 in ranks, and 82 horses; the three batteries of the Artillery, 12 officers, 421 in ranks, 128 other ranks, and 385 horses. This makes a grand total of 25 officers, 669 in other ranks and 568 horses. Two new in camp. All the other units are in process of mobilization.

Notice has been given that the ammunition column now in camp has been designated No. 5 Field Ammunition Corps of the expeditionary force. The camp band playing at 9 a.m. today in the dairy building. Major W. P. Butcher, C.I. C.S.M., lectured in the dairy building last evening "On Patrol and Patrolling." On Monday night Major H. C. Bickford, G.S.O., will lecture on "Co-operation of the Different Arms of the Service."

There will be an early morning service for Anglicans at 7 o'clock and celebration of Mass for the Roman Catholic members at 8.30 o'clock. The two early services are held in the dairy building. A C. Cochrane having been replaced by Lieut. R. H. Turnbull, who reported to the officer commanding 19th divisional battalion on the 3rd inst. Until further orders Lieut. (Prov.) H. W. Murray will act as assistant.

Home Guard Active

The Toronto Home Guard will parade 2,300 strong at Scarborough Beach Athletic Park tomorrow afternoon. Orders have been issued to the regiment, band, buglers and signallers to parade at full strength at 2 p.m. Band proceeded to the Beach by street car, to return to the armories by route march. Various drills will be gone thru in front of a moving picture camera and the films will be exhibited in a number of prominent Toronto theatres. While the pictures are being taken a band concert will take place.
