

PIONEER RECRUITS START TO ENROL

Sixty Give in Names First Day and Complement Expected Soon

Recruiting for the 2nd Overseas' Pioneer Battalion commenced at the armories yesterday, 60 men being enrolled. Part of these are new recruits and the others men transferred from other regiments.

Lieut.-Col. W. M. Davis, commander of the Pioneers, states that he expects to have enough men for his battalion within two weeks. It has not yet been decided whether the Pioneers will go into camp at Niagara. The battalion will be the first Canadian Pioneers battalion to go to the front.

376 This Week.

Active service men recruited in Toronto so far this week total 376. Yesterday's enlistments were 57, which is the lowest figure reported by the recruiting depot for some time. A total of 891 overseas men are now training in Toronto. This is a good showing for the week.

QUEBEC RAILWAY SOLD AT ADVANCED PRICE

This About Only Feature of Mon

real Stock Exchange Showing Interest.

MONTREAL, Sept. 16.—Except for some activity in Quebec Railway advancing prices early in the day, today's session of the local stock exchange was marked by a continuation of dullness. Quebec Railway common sold as high as 147 in the morning against a high of 141 on Wednesday, but sold off to 131 1/2 by the close. The price was well above the low of the day. That is only the fraction of the early rise of 1 3/4 points. The price of the common was changed hands against 2000 the previous day.

The only feature among the war of some activity was a demand for Scotch Steel in the afternoon. On buying about 600 shares the price rose from 86 to 87 1/2. With last transaction at 86, the Scotch Steel of Canada was inclined to sag, and finished with

small losses at 43 1-4 and 32 3-8 respectively. Bridge was inactive and quoted fractionally lower at the end of the day. Canadian Car was the only stock in the group to show actual weakness. It sold off from 107 1/2 the morning to 106 by noon and in the afternoon fell to 104, finishing at its lowest with a loss of three points.

Business thru the balance of the day was slight. Total business for the day—507 shares, 85 mines and \$7600 bonds.
