What invaluable possessions then are Gibraltar and Minorca, Port Mahon, and the Mole at Gibraltar; a safe asylum for Admiral Mann, and two or three frigates. I understand that a squadron is destined for the protection of our fettlements in the East-Indies, where, at present, we have only two ships of the line, and two or three frigates. This great branch of our commerce seems to have been neglected in the fame manner as the West-Indies. The favourite project, the conquest of America, feems to have absorbed every other concern. Betore Sir Edward Hughes arrives in the East-Indies, it is highly probable we may have little left there to protect. The French have been long accumulating a force at the Mauritius. Their plan is to attack our fettlements, or else, as an Honourable Gentleman afferted in the House of Commons, they
