## FRENCH BLOUSES.

There is a pretty new lingerie collection which outvalues the more elaborately trimmed waists in its charm of color. It is a colored lawn "over waist" in delicate pale or light blue and made from one of the popular patterns with low cut arms and neck. A few fine tucks are set in along the front and the whole is edged with an insertion of lace embroidery interlacing along the shoulders. This is worn over an embroidered net waist with sleeves of full Valenciennes edgings and under this is worn a silk slip in the same shade as the outside lawn.

The rage for color under the lace undergarments has taken the place of the color undergarments. Only that in these thinner, more open materials lawn will do as a makeshift and silk and even shimmering and high surfaced satins are used. Rich open patterned edgings are mounted over light colored satins and vivid satin linings are worn over thinner lace waists, which are first mounted on white china silk, pink being the preferred color, as the result is a soft pink glow shade.

Palms, ranging from 50c to \$10. Boston ferns, 25c up, with fern pans at different prices.

Turnips, 30c to 40c a bag. Carrots, 30c to 40c a bag. Beets, 30c to 40c a bag. Cabbage, 60c to \$1 a dozen.

**CANADIAN INDUSTRIES PAY.** Another Successful Year of a Leading Canadian Manufacturer.

The annual meeting of the shareholders of the Slater Shoe Company was held at their offices in Montreal a few days ago. The address of the president laid stress on the continuous progress of the company's business since the start of the year. Slater Shoe became the feature of the business.

The Slater Company were the first Canadian manufacturers to adopt the new advertising as an adjunct to the more economical selling of their goods. In five years their business had more than doubled. In 1906 the increase over 1905 was exactly \$200,000.

While this year achieves the largest increase in a single year, it is also by far the largest percentage increase in twelve months. The orders for the first six months of their present fiscal year exceed those of the corresponding months of the previous year by \$150,000.

Nineteen agencies were opened by the company during the year. Orders came unsolicited from thirty foreign countries, including South Africa, the West Indies, and from Newfoundland. The president pointed out the need for more factory accommodation. "We have outgrown our present quarters," he said. "The directors arranged to hold a special meeting to deal with factory requirements and extension."

The financial report of the secretary-treasurer, with a dividend of 7 per cent. on both preferred and common stock, and a substantial balance added to reserve account, was received with approval by the shareholders.

The board of directors were elected as follows: Charles E. Slater, president; William Slater, vice-president; A. McKim, J. N. McKim, W. F. Evers, William Smith, J. W. Woods, and Major Robert Starke.

**NATIONAL PERSIAN BANK.** Concession Has Been Granted From Which Foreigners Are Excluded.

Teheran, Persia, Feb. 6.—A concession for a national bank with a capital of \$25,000,000 has been signed. Foreigners are excluded from the project.

London, Feb. 6.—Officials of the Imperial Bank of Persia here state that the concession, including the exclusive right to issue bank notes, still has fifty days to run.

**COAL AND WOOD**

NO COAL IN WINNIPEG FACTORIES CLOSE DOWN

Wood Growing Scarce and Fuel Problem Has Reached an Acute Stage.

Winnipeg, Feb. 6.—(Special.)—The fuel situation is growing serious in Winnipeg and dealers are practically out of coal.

The Sherwin-Williams establishment shut down to-day and others may be compelled to follow suit.

Wood is growing scarce and the board of control is taking up the question in earnest in an endeavor to reach a solution. Where the coal is to come from is a problem. Port Arthur is out and Fort William stock is growing short, while it is useless to look to Minneapolis or Duluth.

The only hope is wood, and as there is said to be plenty on the branch lines of the C.N.R. and C.P.R. every nerve will be strained to get those lines to open them.

**FERRY BOAT ON FIRE.** 200 Passengers Get a Scare in the North River.

New York, Feb. 6.—Fire was discovered on the New Jersey Central ferryboat Wilkesbarre late to-day as it was nearing its slip in the ferry house at the foot of West 22nd-street and North River. The crew was quickly carried to quarters and confined the flames to the rear pilot house, where they originated. No one was injured.

There were 200 passengers on board, and when the fire broke out a rush was made for the shore end of the boat.

The fire, which is believed to have been started by defective electric insulation, was whipped by the west wind to a brisk blaze. The scared passengers crowded the front deck of the boat and leaped ashore the instant the boat reached the slip.
