

4 Favorites at Woodbine Peter Pan Wins Belmont

STANLEY PRODUCE FOR SEAGRAM SEA WALL CANTERS HOME IN FRONT

Tongorider Beat Charlie Eastman and Deuce — Another Steeplechase for Picktime — Four Favorites Get the Money.

Four favorites, two well played second choices and one well played third choice, were the winners over a fast track on Friday at Woodbine Park. The weather was ideal for racing, and the good card aided in bringing out one of the best week-day crowds of the season. Tongorider showed himself a good horse now by winning all round from Charlie Eastman and Deuce, but one more stake went to the latter of Waterloo when his speedy ally Sea Wall, that missed nothing except the King's Plate, rumped home ahead in the Stanley Produce. Picktime, well ridden by Brant, put another steeplechase to his credit, the beaten favorite, Oscar 7, finished third and Gold Run and Picconino opened the money.

Before the races Dr. Andrew Smith presented E. King Dods, the veteran journalist, with a testimonial from his friends, consisting of a piece of plate and a cheque for \$200. Dr. Smith, who has been in the saddle for many years, is a member of the speed of the racing interests of Canada.

Lord Bonerages Wins First. Lord Bonerages, E. W. Lagoo's good colt, was the favorite for the first race at 6 furlongs with General second choice at 5-2, and this is the way they finished. Dog Rose, with Nicol up, was tipped off as the good thing, but beyond leading for a short distance after the start, he was never dangerous as a winner, the Tongorider had to do his best to hold the place.

The racing program concluded with the National Club Purse at one mile and sixteenth. There were eight starters with at least four of them looking like they had a good chance to win. It was a real good race, with Cursus in front at the wire. Bon Mot got up in time to be second, a head in front of Warring. Five of the eight were played to win. Today's card is of seven purses, and looks anything but easy picking.

Straus ran up Canoplan, the winner of the last race to \$100, taking him at that figure. Mr. Walker, the owner, claimed and secured Warring from J. J. Farrel, out of the same race, for \$845.

KEENE ENTRY RAN 1-2 RICH BELMONT STAKES

Peter Pan 1, Superman 2, Frank Gill 3—Good and Plenty Again Beaten.

NEW YORK, May 30.—Peter Pan, a sturdy son of the great Commando, defeated his brother, Superman, by three lengths for the rich Belmont Stakes at Belmont Park.

John H. Keene, who trained the colts, brought to stable \$23,000 and the handsome plate that each year is given the winner. Frank Gill, the big ungainly chestnut colt from the string of Lucky Jack, was third. It is estimated that 40,000 persons saw the races. The Keene stable was the favorite. The race over the eleven furlongs was a heart-breaking one from start to finish. The time taken, which is admittedly wrong, the green jacket of Eddie on Hickory, Peter Pan was about 170 feet from the finish, shows that the race was run in about 2:18. Even this would clip two seconds off the best time for the course, made by Burgomaster last year.

When the barrier flashed the ave-horns went off a beautiful start. Out of the chute across the straight track and into the "8" course darted the green jacket of Eddie on Hickory, with Paumonok at his withers. Peter Pan's nose was in line with Keener's stirrup. Well in hand, a length back ran Superhuman and Frank Gill.

Quick changes occurred even in the first stride, for when the pole was reached, Peter Pan, now well into his stride, had taken the lead, and was followed by Frank Gill. The pace was too hot for Paumonok and Hickory, and they fell back respectively to fifth and third places. Superman had moved into third place and was still being closely rated by Miller.

On the upper turn Gill drew on even terms with Peter Pan and head and head they raced down the gradual winding way to the final turn. Meantime Miller had let out Superman somewhat and he closed in on the leaders with such a burst of speed that the crowd, which hitherto had remained silent, burst into cries of "Superman will win." "Come on you, Miller," the cry was heard. But strong was the Brooklyn Handicap winner under his impetus of 126 lbs., the spectators lost track of the race.

The strength of Peter Pan, Mountain heard the roar as he and Notter brought their mounts into the stretch for the final run, and gave Peter Pan his head. He responded with a renewed burst of speed and drew away from Frank Gill, Superman, coming from the rear, and overtaking the McGinnis horse, made it appear as the Gill had stopped dead in his tracks. In second place now, Miller, leaped over the whispering encouragement in Superman's ear and patted his neck. It was all up with Notter, but, nevertheless, he went to his whip. Gill responded bravely for three or four strides and then gradually fell back. Peter Pan was two and a half lengths in front of Superman at the finish and Gill was five lengths behind Superman.

The others were beaten off. The talent suffered a hard blow from the defeat of Good and Plenty by T. S. Martin in the Whitney Memorial Steeplechase. Summaries:
