TANGIER, Aug. 15 .- The European victims of the original massacre at Casablanca were buried yesterday with impressive ceremonies. The foreign consuls, Gen. Drude, commander of the French expeditionary force; a detachment of troops, and Europeans to the number of 500 followed the hearses to the graves. The funeral oration was delivered by the French vice-consul.

The bombardment of Casablanca has produced a deep impression at Fez. The government received the news well, and at once provided guards for all Euro-pean residents, urging them not to leave the city, where it guarantees their


