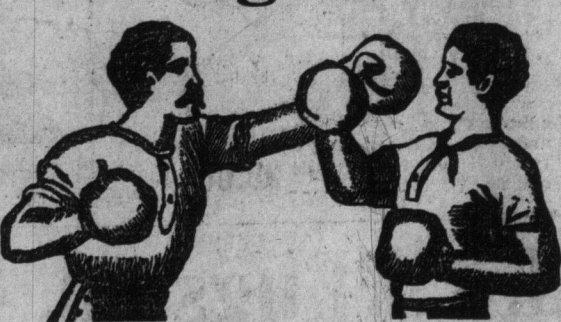

THE AMATEUR AT HENLEY.

He is Now the Ordinary Sculler or Oarsman Who Has Not Competed for Money.

FOREIGN ENTRIES BY MARCH 31.

American Sprinters Who Are Entered for the Christmas Handicap at Sheffield.

The latest English mail shows that in spite of winter sport is still in the ascendancy in the Old Country. Oxford and Cambridge decided their trial-night race on Dec. 3. The men who competed, with form a nucleus for the 'varsity' crews who will commence training for their annual struggle early in January.

University circles have been concerned over the proposed alterations in the program of events for the annual games between Oxford and Cambridge that has stood untouched for years. Oxford contended for the introduction of a half-mile run and the exclusion of throwing the hammer and putting the shot. The Captains agreed to the addition of the half-mile. Oxford then gave way and agreed to both weights being retained. It was also agreed to adopt the A.A.A. rules for hammer-throwing in future, and use a 16-foot instead of a 30-foot circle. This change will make the program consist of ten events, and render the chance of a tie greater than under the old regime.

Secretary Cooper has denied the rumor that in the future the men who would not be accepted for the Henley regatta. He states that the entry of any genuine amateur crew or American university will be welcomed. The rule that foreign entries must be received before March 31, 1899, will be adhered to. The prevailing feeling in England is that, in stead of further limiting the field, the greatest business should be allowed, and that the exclusive Henley definition of an amateur, one who has not worked for money, should be changed to 'one who has not competed for money.' The reason for this change of sentiment is the concerted movement now going on in Australia, Canada and South Africa to send representative athletes, teams and crews to compete in England next year. The colonies will not send the athletes without the sanction of the American professional sprinters appear to 'have their eye' on the \$500 in prize, and accompanying expenses, offered by the Smith for the Christmas Sheffield Handicap. Though only three entered the New Year's event, there are no less than 11 who state they live in America and are on the list for the 102-yard race on Dec. 27 and 28. P. Kenne has nice yards; Downer, the virtual scratch man, is on the list. Walter Christie, the twelve-7-yard mark, has 10 1/2 yards, and on the same mark with him are M. C. Williams, Cuckoo Collins, A. J. Rogers, C. Mann and J. Bellamy. Others from America who are more liberally treated by the handicapper are H. Bellamy, W. B. Brier, 12 yards; J. Gibson, 14 yards, and S. Peat, 15 yards. Dublin and Edinburgh Universities fought out their annual cross-country race on Dec. 9 near Edinburgh, and, when the score was tallied, it was found that each University had scored 18 points.

TALK OF BASEBALL SHUFFLES

National League Contractions Should Assist the Minor—Toronto and the West.

Baseball circles generally regard the consolidation of the Baltimore and Brooklyn Clubs as the first step towards a return to the eight-club league. On the heels of this transfer are growing rumors that the Clevelanders are to be shifted to St. Louis, and if this is accomplished the rest will not be hard. The league will then have to buy out Washington and Cleveland and the eight clubs will have things their own way. Still many well-informed writers say that the old twelve-club circuit will prevail.

The effect of the proposed change, should it take place, upon minor league ball has not been closely figured. Minor leagues will welcome the change, as there will be more players on the market, and the drafting process will not be carried on to such a great extent. The four clubs that will be dropped in case of the change, average nearly 50 men each, and this will throw about 80 players on the market. As there will be no National League berths for these men they will doubtless be compelled to accept lower salaries and play in the minor leagues or quit the game.

Louisville would be desirable in the west circuit, according to the Sunday ball, but it would make a great change in the mileage of the teams. The eastern circuit could then run from Buffalo to Louisville, and it is a question whether the Kentucky town would be as valuable even with its Sunday games as Toronto would be with only six days of playing, says President of Deereok of Detroit.

"I do not expect to see an American association before 1900 if the league does not come out of its slumber. We could not form an association unless we had four eastern cities, Buffalo, Baltimore, Boston and Washington would be the available towns, while in the west we would have Detroit, Indianapolis, Louisville, Kansas City and Milwaukee. One of them would have to be dropped, and I do not believe we could make as much money as we have with the Western League, because of the big jumps and the natural increase in salaries.

"They will all be paying attention to the Western league and its future and as we have the whip hand I guess we will just stand pat."

New York, Dec. 22.—Mysterious Billy Smith has signed articles with boxer Charley Johnson before the Olympic A.C., Buffalo, on Jan. 3. The affair will be for twenty rounds.

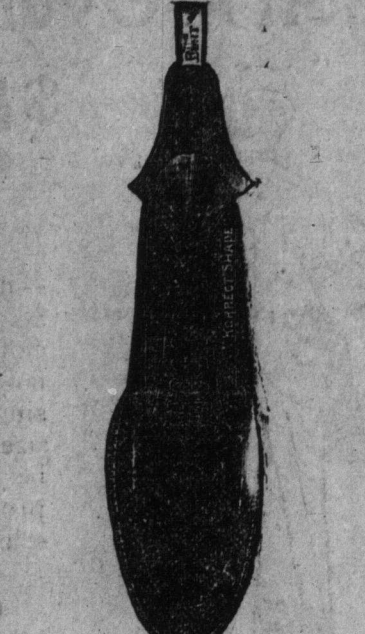
Spick Sullivan says that he will be present at the bout between Jack Daly and Joe Gans at the Lenox A.C., and will challenge the winner.
