

**Liberals Claim That They Are Not Able
to Locate Thomas Robson,
M. L. A., to Serve Him.**

WAS MARRIED TO AN INSANE MAN.

**Attorney-General's Action to Re-
cover Succession Duties from
the Austin Estate.**

Efforts of lawyers and sheriff have failed to locate Capt. Thomas Robson, M.L.A., for the purpose of serving him with the petition the Liberals have filed against his return as member for East Middlesex. The court has, as a result, extended the time for the service of that document for two weeks. Sheriff's Officer A. W. Harris says he has failed to discover the member's whereabouts, tho he has searched the Parliament Buildings and the hotels.

Married to an Insane Man.
Mrs. Pauline Dietrick, also known as Pauline Herres, is suing William H. Herres, now an inmate of the Hamilton Asylum for the Insane, on the following grounds: "That the marriage ceremony performed between them be declared null and void ab initio." The plaintiff, who lives at Callan-

der, in Perry Sound District, was married to the defendant on Oct. 4, 1889, at South Oliver, in the said district. Immediately after, the plaintiff noticed that defendant was not of sound mind and it became necessary to remove him to the Hamilton Asylum. The plaintiff claims to have discovered that in the year previous to their marriage the defendant had been confined in an asylum at Kingston for a term of

Three months and that, having only recently
his acquaintance a short time before the
marriage, she was unaware of this last fact,
and claims that the defendant induced her
by fraud to marry him as representing him-
self to be a person of sound mind.

The action will be tried here at the Non-
Jury Sittings. Mr. John Hoskin, official
guardian, having charge of the defendant's
case.

Case of James Austin's Estate.
The action of the Attorney-General of Ontario against A. W. Austin and Mrs. A. J. Arthur, executors of the estate of the late James Austin of Toronto and late president of the Dominion Bank, for the recovery of succession duties on the deceased's estate, was yesterday set down for hearing at the Non-Jury Sittings. The claim is made that the deceased disposed of the

great bulk of his estate to trustees in 1892, or some five years before his death. In order that his estate should escape the duties. At the time of his death his estate amounted to \$72,000, while in 1892 deceased disposed of property worth \$648,000, including real estate \$150,000, mortgages \$110,000, stocks \$200,000 and Manitoba assets \$185,000.

Evans' Last Will.

Mr. Justice Ferguson yesterday handed out judgment in the action of Evans v. Evans, tried by him at Walkerton this month. The action was by John Evans of Esequing Township in Halton County, against Martha Evans of Port Elgin, widow of Samuel Evans, a brother of the plaintiff, for a declaration that a will made by the deceased, bequeathing his property to the plaintiff, be recognized as the last will

Must Buy Him a New Ticket.
Chief Justice Armour yesterday heard the application of J. R. Moore of Hartney, Man., to set aside a capias issued in Hamilton, while he was there on his honeymoon, and under which he was taken into custody under the act respecting absconding debtors, at the instance of John Calder & Co.,

to whom he was indebted. His Lordship enlarged the application for one week, directing that Calder & Co. buy Moore a new ticket to Manitoba in the event of the return ticket he now has running out before he is released. Moore, who ran a general store at Hartney, some time ago failed and the complainants had him arrested, alleging that he had skipped out to avoid settling with his creditors.

A third attempt was made yesterday by the Sheppard Publishing Company to postpone the trial of the Mayor's action against them for libel. They claim that Fred Coleman, who is a necessary and material witness for them, supposed to be living in California, could not be found. The Master-in-Chambers decided that before making any order to postpone the trial, he

would allow the plaintiff to examine "Sut-
tary-Treasurer Butchart of the defendant
company in order to ascertain from him
whether Coleman will really be needed as a
witness.
