CASE UP NEXT WEEK ON APPAM OWNERSHIP

WASHINGTON, Jan. 5.—British claimants of the prize ship Appam, brought to Newport News last February by a German prize crew, filed their brief with the Supreme Court today in the habeas corpus proceedings brought to regain possession of the vessel and her cargo. The case will be argued next week. The brief contends that under German-American treaties and international conventions the Appam's captors lost title to their prize when they brought her into American waters.

MR. ROWELL HURLS BACK CHARGES AT W. SIMCOE MEETING

No Man Has Right to Appeal
to Prejudices.

NO FRIEND OF LIQUOR MEN

Pledge Votes for Convictions
as Canadian Heroes
Pledge Lives.

COLLINGWOOD, Jan. 5.—"I ask the citizens of West Simcoe to be true to their own honest convictions, to vote as patriot citizens. If you believe that our principles are sound, that our policy is worth while, that our fight is good, in the public interest and for the promotion of the welfare of Ontario, then I ask you, men, women and young people, to give us your support and encouragement."

And protesting cheating, N. W. Rowell, Ontario's Liberal leader, thus closed an earnest and eloquent message at the big meeting of West Simcoe electors, which overflowed the opera house, tonight. Rowell, who has spoken to the large gathering, keenly interested, and at times warmly enthusiastic. From the outset he took high ground, he asked no vote that had not conscience and conviction behind it. He asked no support that had not behind it the force of honesty and consecration to the cause of the Liberalism had espoused.

"If you are with us, if you believe we are right, then, and only then, I ask your support for Isaac Scott," said Mr. Rowell amid cheers.

"No party leader has any right to urge you to vote otherwise, and no party leader has any right to appeal to passion or prejudice."

Conservative Tactics.

In his closing words Mr. Rowell referred with the warmth of indignation to the attack in the local Conservative press on the candidates. "Such a campaign, and himself, an attack which alleged, among other things, that the election was being financed by the liquor men and liquor interests of Toronto, and the bilingualists of Quebec."

"Our men at the front are pleading their lives for their convictions," declared Mr. Rowell, amid cheers. "So, if we at home can pledge our votes for them, I ask you to do what I am not ready to do myself. For years I have endeavored to reach the goal of temperance progress. I have stood for a policy. I have met opposition. I have fought for it with many worthy men in the party to which I belong, whose convictions differed from mine. I say to you with all sincerity that if I have had any part in making the home life of the province better and sweeter, if I have done anything, even in a small way, to make home mean more to any child, I would sooner have that knowledge than be prime minister of Ontario."

Hurling Charges Back.

"I mean just what I say," reiterated the Liberal leader, now speaking with marked feeling, "and charges of my being associated and allied with liquor interests or with appeals to prejudice, I hurl back in the teeth of those who make them. The record of these years of fighting of campaigning, in good report and in ill, is the answer to such statements." (Loud cheers.)

ANONYMOUS LETTER AS ENEMY CONSUL DEFENCE

Produced in "Frisco Conspiracy Case as Evidence to Clear Bopp.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 5.—Anonymous letters, claiming responsibility for the explosion of a barge of dynamite, figuring in the trial of the German consul-general, Franz Bopp, accused with others of American neutrality violations, were received today by Bopp and the United States attorney prosecuting the case.

The barge was destroyed in Seattle harbor, in May, 1915. The cargo was consigned to Russia.

Destruction of the barge, asserts the Government, was part of a plot by Bopp and his associates to destroy munitions shipments to the Entente Allies. The letters were signed "H. P.," the writer saying he would appear at the trial next Monday, "and perhaps surrender."

The Government reacted its case today with the provision that it might call another witness in rebuttal. The case is expected to go to the jury Tuesday or Wednesday of next week.

MAY CENSOR NEWS FROM KITCHENER

Rumor That Secret Service Men Will Watch Dispatches.

SALE OF HOLSTEINS

DORCHESTER, Jan. 5.—A successful sale was held here by Dr. Stanley Shaw, when he sold twenty Holstein cows for \$2,000. This made an average of \$100 each. He purchased the entire herd from James Barrons, of Westminster. Owing to the illness of the two Dorchester teachers, one of the rooms in the public school was closed for a short time this week, but Miss Baker has been secured to fill the vacancy. Miss Rath, their supply teacher, has now taken the junior grade.

CLAIM \$100,000.

HALIFAX, Jan. 5.—In the admiralty court today Registrar J. L. Barnhill took the evidence of the captain, mate, engineer and other members of the crew of the Belgian motor ship Emanuel Nobel, which was towed into Halifax a week after having been disabled off Sheet Harbor, and in danger of being wrecked on the shore. In this case the plaintiffs are the F. W. Roebeling Company, Limited, the Halifax and Canoe Company, and the Halifax and Sheet Harbor Steamship Company, as the owners of the F. W. Roebeling Company, the Scotia and the Margaret. They claim \$100,000 salvage for rescuing the ship and bringing her to port.

E. H. SOTHERN SERIOUSLY ILL.
CHICAGO, Jan. 5.—E. H. Sothern, the actor, who has been ill here, left for New York tonight, accompanied by his wife, formerly Julia Marlowe, and his physicians. His condition is a matter of concern among his friends.

EMPLOYERS OBJECT TO BECOMING LIABLE FOR PHYSICIANS' FEES

Workmen's Compensation Act
Again Under Discussion.

THINK IT BURDENSOME

Urge That Slight Increase
Will Destroy Export
Trade.

TORONTO.—"If you are intending to put this burden of medical expenses on the manufacturers, we should get some satisfactory quid pro quo. We are willing to enter into negotiations and suggest certain amendments to the workmen's compensation act. As regards the appointment of medical men and the scale of charges, we consider, in the event of the burden of cost being placed upon us, that these appointments should be in our hands, subject to the approval of the workmen's compensation board. I think it is only fair if we are going to pay the bill we should have something to say as to the appointment of the medical men."

Just as the conference at the Parliament Buildings yesterday between the various interests concerned in the workmen's compensation act and proposed amendments, including provision of medical expenses of the injured, seemed to be pretty well through, the position of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association was stated in the words mentioned by H. J. Thomas, representing J. R. Booth, Ottawa. In further remarks, he took a serious view of burdening the industry, as the manufacturers had to compete with people in the states of the union and other countries.

Same in States.

Premier Hearst.—When you come into competition with the states of the union, you come into contact with people who have also workmen's compensation burdens.

Mr. Thomas—I am inclined to think that the burden is not so great in the majority of the states. You may destroy that export trade by even a slight additional burden.

Hon. Mr. Lucas.—Have you anything to indicate what the burden would be? Mr. Thomas—No figures are available. Premier Hearst.—What percentage would it add to your assessment?

Mr. Thomas—Have you any figures? I do not think there is any doubt it would be a large sum. It is not a small item.

Mr. George Douglas of Douglas & Thornton, Hamilton, also thought the burden on industry should not be overlooked, declaring that the cost of production was an essential thing for the success of this country. He had no hesitation in saying workmen's compensation legislation should be handled on a business basis, and then they would have something more tangible and something fair. He objected to a guarantee of the doctors' fees being placed in the act.

"Why should they not take the same chance in their profession as we take in our business?" he asked. The manufacturers, if such was decided, would assume liability, property presented. They did not want a schedule as to doctors' fees placed in the act.

GRAIN ELEVATORS WARNED AGAINST BLENDING GRAIN

Any Deviation Will Mean Suspension of License.

PORT WILLIAM, Jan. 5.—This morning all hospital elevator interests received the following letter over the signature of the secretary of the Dominion Grain Association:

"Under directions from the board, I am today notifying the chief inspector and chief weighmaster that on and after February 1, 1917, all hospital elevator owners and operators will be prohibited from mixing or blending grains in their elevators. Any deviation from or disregard of this order will mean immediate suspension of license."

"Commissioner J. P. Jones, of the board, says that its effect will be to make hospitals live up to the technical interpretation of the act as it stands today. This hospital elevators will be able to do nothing but terminal storage, and to fulfill their ostensible function of taking care of damaged grain."

LEMOGUES, France, Jan. 5.—La France Militaire today publishes the following general order to the troops issued by General Nivelle:

"At a time when another year of the war is ending you can be proud of the work accomplished. At Verdun you broke the most powerful blow Germany ever struck against any of her adversaries. On the Somme, emulating the courage of our British allies, during a long series of attacks, you have given proof of a tactical superiority which will continue to improve. Never has our army been better trained or more brave or possessed of more powerful means."

"It is under these brilliant auspices that the work of 1917 begins. You will make it a year of victory. In this absolute confidence I send you all officers and soldiers, my most affectionate wishes for the new year."
