

BALANCE \$1,664,893 ON YEAR'S BUSINESS OF BANK OF MONTREAL

Montreal, Nov. 20.—The annual statement of the Bank of Montreal shows \$403,980,236, as compared with \$365,215,541 in 1916, for the fiscal year ended. October 31, 1917. As the bank of the Government, the Bank of Montreal has assumed its full share in providing for the country's needs, as indicated by an increase of \$28,000,000 in the value of Dominian and Provincial Government securities; an increase of \$27,000,000 in the deposits in central gold reserve; the balance due to the Dominian Government of \$13,636,962, the latter account appearing for the first time in the bank's statement. The bank has rendered great service to the country by doing its part to create complete confidence in Canada's fiscal position during a trying period. The savings account now amounts to over \$246,000,000, an increase of almost \$36,000,000 for the year. The net profits for the twelve months amounted to \$2,477,369, equivalent to 15.49 per cent on the paid-up capital. The total available for distribution was \$3.892,283. Of this amount dividends and bonds required \$1,920,000 war tax on bank note circulation, \$160,000; subscriptions to patriotic fund, \$73,500 (of which paid \$47,500); reserve for bank premises, \$100,000; leaving a balance to be carried forward into the new year of \$1,664,893, as compared with \$1,414,423 at the end of the previous year.
