

CYNTHIA GREY'S MAIL-BOX

Grey, Pink and White. My Dear Miss Grey,-This is to tell 'Polly" about making paper beads. I made some just before last Christmas. I strung them together with some colored glass beads and made them into necklaces or fan strings.

First comes the selection of the paper. I found that sample books of wallpaper give one the greatest variety of colors. In making your pattern, cut several kite-shape patterns for models. When you have one the size you want, make several tracings on the best colored parts of each sheet and cut them out. Begin rolling on a knitting needle rather loosely at first and from the head end, finishing more firmly toward the tail end. Finally securely paste end down and remove the needle. Give the beads a good coating or two of white vamish. One of my friends made a portiere of them, but, candidly speaking, I think it a waste of time, as the fad for paper beads has about run its limit, and portieres of any kind are such dust-catchers.

I wonder if you readers would be interested in my room? Girls are always interested in each other's homes. My color scheme is grey, pink and white. 
