LEAGUE OF NATIONS **NECESSARY AS FIRST** STEP TOWARD PEACE

Lord Robert Cecil Gives Opinion On Formation of a Society of Nations.

NAVIES FOR DEFENCE

Paris, Jan. 8 .- By the Associated Press .- Lord Robert Cecil, who has arrived here with the first section of th British peace delegation, expressed the opinion to the Associated Press today that the definite organization of a lergue of nations is indispensable as a first step toward the conclusion of that enduring peace and a satisfactory settlement of international problems which have arisen out of the war. which have arisen out of the war.

Lord Robert made it clear that his statements were personal views, and not an attempt to give the views of the British Government. the British Government.

"In my opinion a league of nations is recessive as the initial step in the peace negotiations," said Lord Robert.

"It is not only necessary to insure peace, but also for the proper treatment of many international questions which must be considered by the peace congress. It is our business to give this league definite form here and now."

Lord Robert made it clear in his talk that he has little sympathy with the view that the peace congress may gradually drift into a proionged session which will ultimately become a league of nations without being definitely and positively organized.

Asked how far armaments can be limited by a league or nations. Lord my opinion, is probably the ult problem the peace con-

impossible to prevent individuals carrying arms to protect themselves against outlawry. Laws against the carrying of firearms could not be enforced until the necessity for carrying them ceased to exist. So it is with the league.

"The world did not know how extensively Germany was preparing for war. She might develop another force under the guise of militia. These are the difficulties we have to face, but we must endeavor earnestly to secure co-operation between the powers represented at the congress in a broad policy of demobilization which will correspond with the yearnings of all peoples to be relieved from the burdens they have borne for these last four and a half years."

EBERT'S TROOPS DRIVE SPARTACANS BACK. Basle, Jan. 9 .- Troops loyal to the Ebert Government have arrived in Berlin from Potsdam and driven the Spartacans as far as the Tiergarten and re-occupied the printing works, according to the Frankfort Zeitung.

New York, Jan. 9.—With approximately 15,000 men affected, the strike of the marine workers affiliation went into effect here at 6 a.m. today. At that hour, fireboats, steam lighters, towhoats, coal barges, grain boats and other harbor craft were at a standstill, according to the strike leaders. Union officials announced that all the city's fire and police boats would be tied up by the calling out of their crews. They explained that it would probably be noon before all ferry transit was discontinued, owing to the time consumed in reaching all the members with the strike, they threatened to call out the longshoremen, numbering 70,000 men.
