WONDERFUL SHOOTING ACT PRESENTED AT THE GRAND THEATRE

Remarkable Marksmanship Is Exhibited by "General" Pisano.

It was hardly a shooting act; rather a series of miracles performed by a human being with eyes and hand in perfect harmony which "General" Pisano gave last night at the Grand Opera House, and which he repeats today and Saturday. Backed by most realistic scenery representing a section of the Italian front along the Plate River, Pisano gives a display of shooting seldom if ever equalled for its accuracy and sensationalism, when from two-thirds the depths of the theatre he hits with unerring aim a target no larger than a dime (so small that it has to be illuminated to make it visible at the distance), the audience gasps. It is incredible shooting, yet it is fact. His "stunts" are numerous, and each one as miraculous as the other. Of him it may be said with truth that he alone is worth the price of admission.

Then, as a feature moving picture, the one and only Nazimova appears in "Out of the Fog," an unusual and gripping story, full of pathos, yet not harrowing to the feelings. Scope is given the star to utilize her extraordinary dramatic ability, and she gives it full sway in her two distinctive roles. Few, if any, finer films have been shown here.

Other acts which help to fill out a well-balanced bill are The Leoras, in a thrilling aerial novelty; Millard Brothers, in really humorous comedy; Josephine Barlowe and Helen Deeres in a dialogue and singing turn, which is wholesome and entertaining, and Jarvis and Harrison, in a comedy, "Shooting the Chutes."

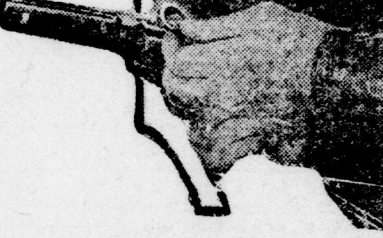
