

FIFTEEN-ROUND BOUTS ARE NOW LEGALIZED

IN STATE OF NEW YORK Albany, N.Y., March 10.—The Walker bill, legalizing boxing in New York State, was reported favorably yesterday by the Senate judiciary committee by a vote of 9 to 3.

As finallly amended, the bill provides for fifteen-round bouts, under a state commission of three, a \$5,000 a year, with a licensing committee of three, who will serve without pay.

Boxing by youths under 18 years of age is not permitted, and specific clauses of the bill prohibit the selling of more tickets for a bout than there are seats. are seats.


