CANADIAN CREDITS TO EUROPEAN NATIONS WILL BE WOUND UP

After Middle of November Only Open Credit Will Be For Timber.

[Special to The Advertiser.] OTTAWA, Sept. 17. - Canadian credits to European countries will be wound up by the middle of November, when outstanding contracts for serges and freizes have been filled. After that the only open credit will be that for timber, for which an amount of \$50,000,000 was provided. Of the amount, Great Britain took up \$23,458,839.

A total of \$157,000,000 in credits was set aside by the Government. Of this amount something in the neighborhood of \$65,000,000 has been taken up.

The following are the amounts in detail: Rumania, \$20,483,676; Greece, \$7,121,300; Italy, \$6,000,000; France, \$5,000,000; Belgium, \$1.772,206; Great Britain (for timber), \$23,458,839. Rumania's credit was absorbed for miscellaneous supplies. Greece purchased military supplies largely, and Italy bought frozen meats. redits to European countries will be

FOSTER AND DOHERTY MAY ATTEND FIRST MEETING OF LEAGUE


