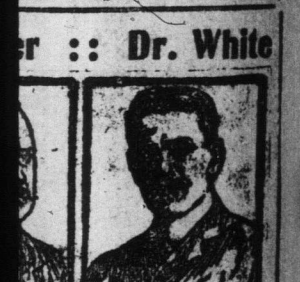

Conference Held Under Auspices of the City of Toronto Proves Conclusively That More Frequent and Convenient and Cheaper Train Accommodation is Alike Desirable and Necessary.

Setting the Wheels in Motion

The suburban service conference in the city hall yesterday morning was one of the most unique and successful events of its kind in the history of Toronto.

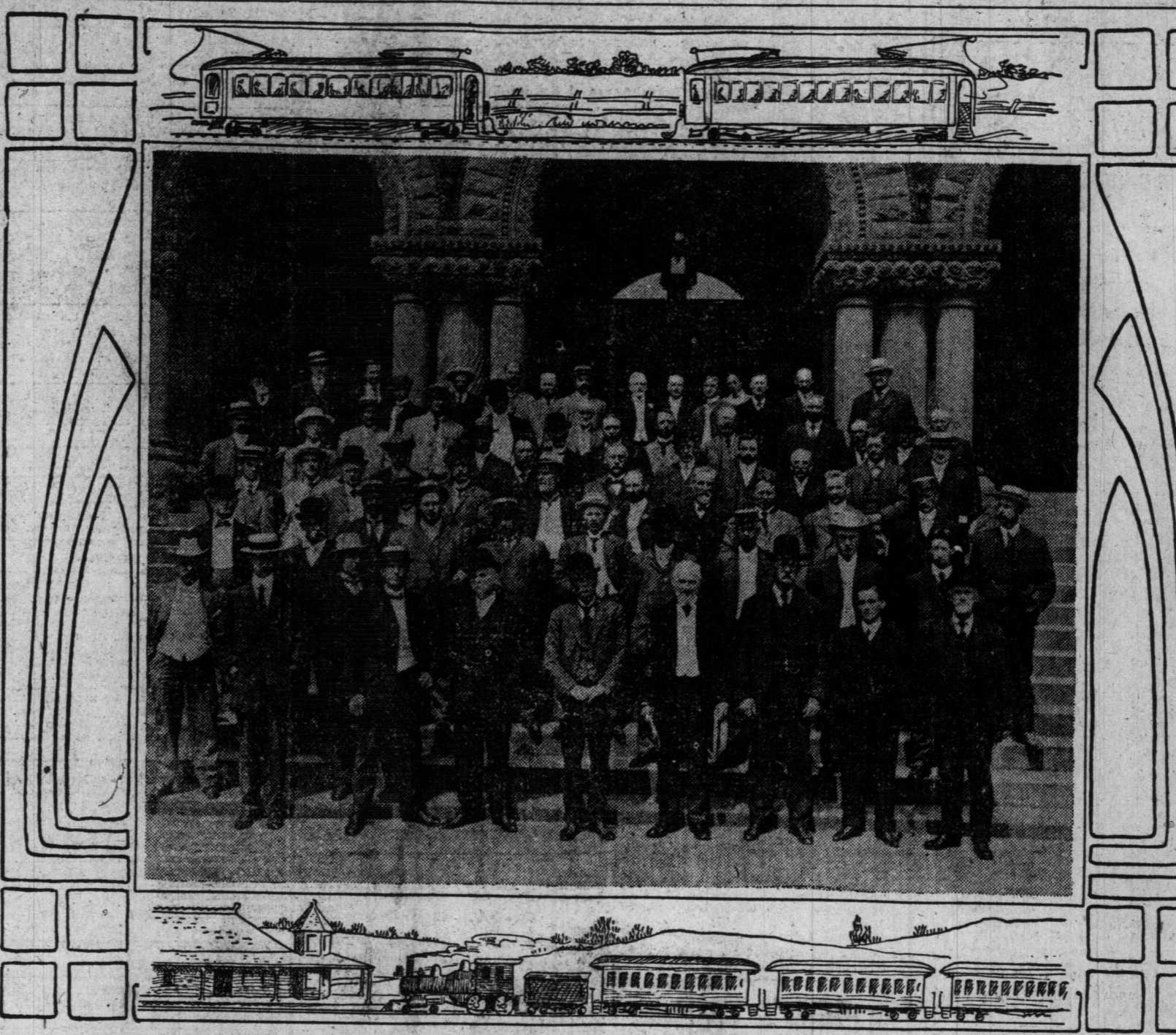
It was unique in that the representatives of a city of 300,000 people and of townships, villages and towns, the homes of 200,000 others, met together with a single purpose, effected an organization and set their faces toward its accomplishment without the sound of a dissenting voice or the shadow of opposition.

Mayors, reeves and deputy reeves rubbed elbows with aldermen, business men, professional men, journalists and citizens. Every man in the gathering bore the imprint of substance; each had property at stake, and many the business and educational welfare of their families. It is significant that men in such numbers could be drawn away from business at a busy period of the year to show by their presence how vital to their welfare, happiness and comfort a suburban service on the street railways is considered.

The note of hostility to the railroads was absent. The invitation, "Come, let us reason together," was vibrant in every speech. Delegates from Whitchy, Oakville, Pickering, from Brampton, Weston and Mayfield, from a dozen other places chose to show that they meant business and believed that their representations would not be unavailing.

I.C.R. MUST KEEP APART FROM THE C.P.R.

Hon. Mr. Emmerson Fights Suggestion That the Latter Be Given Running Rights Over Track.

HALIFAX, N.S., Aug. 20.—(Special.)—The maritime board of trade meetings are gaining in interest and attendance.

The sessions to-day were record breakers in both respects.

So lively did the debate on the question of running rights on the I.C.R. to the C.P.R. from St. John to Halifax become that the debate had to be temporarily adjourned.

Geo. Faulkner, Halifax, moved a resolution affirming that the C.P.R. should be granted running and haulage rights on the I.C.R. on an equal basis with the C.P.R.

The resolution was carried by a large majority.

LOWER WAGE RATE FOR WINTER RELIEF

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ASQUITH AS A PEACEMAKER

Premier Has to Hurry to London to Placate His Secretary of Foreign Affairs.

LONDON, Aug. 20.—The return this morning of Prime Minister Asquith from Scotland, where he had been taking a holiday, and his lengthy conference in Downing-street with Sir Edward Grey, secretary of foreign affairs, are being connected in some quarters with the recent meetings of King Edward and Emperor William and Emperor Francis Joseph.

So far as known, however, nothing occurred at these royal conferences that is likely to have necessitated this urgent meeting of the British ministers.

It is much more probable that Mr. Asquith was obliged to interrupt his holiday to pacify Sir Edward, who, it is known, keenly resents the incursions of Winston Churchill, president of the board of trade, and David Lloyd George, chancellor of the exchequer, into the sphere of the foreign office.

CANADIAN APPLES EXPORTED

Three Shipments of Early Varieties to Be Sent in Cold Storage.

OTTAWA, Aug. 20.—Experimental shipments of early Canadian apples to Britain will be made this month and next on three steamers from Montreal, the first of which will sail on Aug. 22.

The Dominion Government lent its aid to this scheme by guaranteeing payment for one cent per bushel, on each of the three steamers. The first of these has already been practically filled and the government will have to pay for but very little more, if any.

ALBERTA READY TO HONUS

CALGARY, Aug. 20.—(Special.)—In a speech at Cardston, Premier Robertson, in discussing the school book contract, said that the Alberta Government is prepared to bonus any Alberta firm that would undertake the work of publishing text books and come up to the same standard as the contract with the Morang Company set forth.

CANADIAN OIL PO RAVAY

(Canadian Associated Press Cable.)—LONDON, Aug. 20.—J. D. Henry, in The Times, states the time is increasingly opportune and propitious for a renewal of Canada's appeal to the admiralty respecting her oil supply, and adds that Canada is a land of small oil wells and square deals.
