Johnson had been down town getting transportation to Reno for the mem-bers of his camp and was speeding for his quarters at what Lewis says was 50 miles on hour. Lewis attempt-ed to half him. Johnson laughed de-risively at Lewis, shouting: "Oor your way, kids," and was lost in a cloud of dust. Following as ast as his horse could carry him, Lewis arrived a fow minutes after the champion at his training camp, where he toid Johnson that he must be more careful. John-son then declared, according to the son then declared, according to policeman, that an arrest could policeman, that an arrest could be made only over his dead body and lock-ed himself in his room. Summoning two other patrolmen, Lewis kicked in the door. The champion submitted to arrest and accompanied the officers to the office of Chief of Police Martin, who persuaded Lewis to reduce thte charge o resisting an officer to that of speeding. No charge was placed against Sig Hart, who was arrested with Johnson.

Producing \$50 cash ball, Johnson was released and instructed to appear for a hearing in the police court to-morrow morning. If the champion escapes with a fine he will be able to start for Reno to-morrow night, according schedule.
