BIG-BUDGET OF NEWS FROM THE JUNCTION

Norway Conservatives Meet on Saturday Night—Ratepayers Gather at Bracondale.

TORONTO, JUNCTION, Dec. 19.—General dissatisfaction is being expressed at present by the C. P. R. employees as to the mode of the company in the payment of wages. Up till a week ago the men were paid on the 15th of each month, and on Friday evening, when the men were preparing to receive their month's pay, without any previous warning, notices were posted to the effect that the date of payment had been postponed to the 20th. This move of the company has met with universal disapproval among the employees, many of whom had arranged to meet their bills at the earliest date, and as a considerable number of the employees are from the old country, they have been prevented from sending presents home in time for Christmas.

John Pierson of 256 West Dundas-street died this morning, aged 88 years. He was one of the pioneers of the Junction and was largely interested in real estate on Western-avenue at the time of the Junction land boom some 15 years ago. For several years he has conducted a boot and shoe store on Dundas-street. He has been in poor health for the past three months, and death was due to a complication of asthma, dropsy and heart failure. He leaves a widow and grown up family. The funeral will take place on Saturday at 2 p.m. to Prospect Cemetery. The annual commencement of the Toronto Junction Collegiate Institute took place to-night, in the school auditorium. Trustee J. A. Ellis presided. In the absence of J. McCaschem, the chairman of the board, vocal selections were given by Miss Elise Whitmyre and Miss Winter, and encores were responded to. The principal speaker of the evening was Dean Pakenham of the faculty of education, Toronto University. The valedictory address was delivered by Miss Wilhelmina Cobbeck. The students who got highest standing were Miss Jennie McFarlane, Miss Cobbeck and Miss Behest. The scholarship in mathematics and science was won by Miss McFarlane, while Miss Cobbeck gained the scholarship in English and modern languages. Miss Behest gained first class honors in English, French and German. Second class honors in mathematics and Latin and third class in Greek. The diplomas were presented by Prof. J. T. Robertson of Victoria University, who was the first principal of the collegiate when it was established as the Toronto Junction High School.

After the exercises were over a committee was formed of graduates of the school, to arrange for a dinner to be held by the old boys some time after Christmas, at which a permanent Old Boys' organization will be formed. Church held their annual meeting at the home of Mrs. J. Logie, Brakine-avenue, and which, in the opinion of Mr. Shepley, came within the purview of the railway commission.

Re the question of double tracking, the council seems to have a right, Mr. Shepley says, "to insist upon double-tracking instead of lengthening existing switches, but power is not of any great value, as a double track would be more inconvenient to the town than the occasional switch."

Respecting clause 17, relating to the overcrowding of cars, Mr. Shepley says that he was unable to find any agreement as to the regulation of the number of passengers to be carried by any car, but says "it is possible that an indictment against the company for maintaining a nuisance might be maintained," but adds, "the only effective remedy in this direction would be legislation."

Respecting the excessive speed of the Newmarket cars thru the town, Mr. Shepley maintains that the town authorities have practically no jurisdiction in the matter, and advises application to the railway board as the most effective remedy.

The solicitor advises the town to press the matter of snow removal, and failing compliance, go to the railway board.
