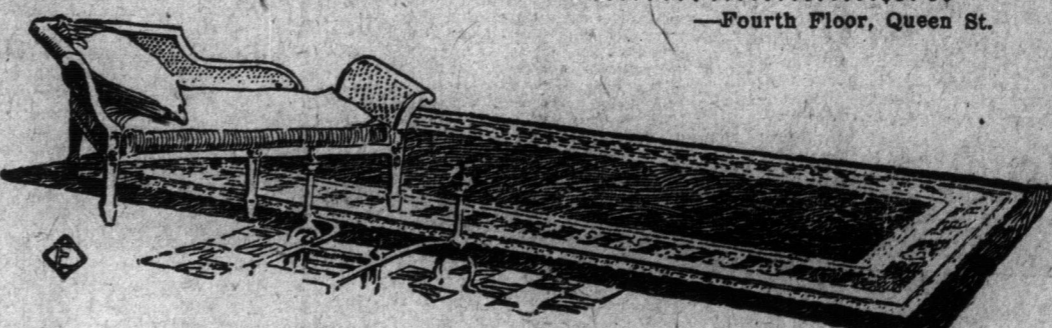

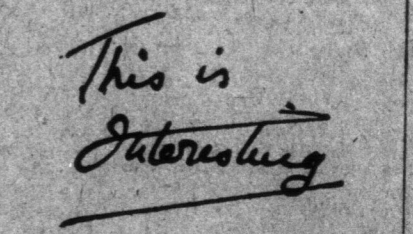

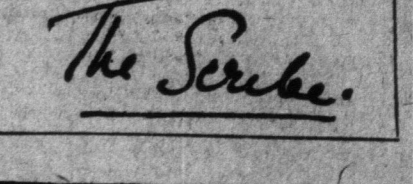

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Allies Arrest Teuton March

attack, and that along the valleys leading from the Berek mountains to the south, the Austrians threw the Russians further back. It is also claimed that several heights on both sides of the Oltuz valley were stormed by German troops. Concerning this operation the Russians tell a different story, asserting that the enemy attacked north and south of the Oltuz valley and that all his efforts were repulsed.

The Teutons claim that they are approaching the bridgehead positions at Fokshani and Fudendi, and that they have taken more than 1,000 prisoners and much war material in this region. In the Dobruja it is claimed that Bulgarian troops captured tenaciously defended Russian positions and threw the Russians back on Machin. It is admitted that between the Buzeu River and the Danube the Russians maintain their position.

The night bulletin issued by Berlin says that nothing further of importance has been reported from the eastern front.

with artillery of all calibres. Here the enemy took the offensive from the village of Rasouch, but was repulsed with heavy losses. In the attempt to advance from the village of Kotumba and in the valley of the River Sulcha, but at both points were arrested by our fire.

"Enemy attempts at the offensive in the Chabanom (Osobanyos?) valley were also unsuccessful. The enemy suffered great losses in wounded and killed.

Foe Beaten on Oltuz. "The enemy also attacked north and south of the Oltuz River valley. All his efforts were repulsed. Scouts were sent out to discover a great number of enemy troops within 200 feet of our trenches.

"On the Rumanian front, the Rumanians, who at first were pressed back by stubborn enemy attacks on the front north and south of the River Kasina, eight vests east from the Hungarian frontier, regained their positions by a counter-attack and still firmly retain it notwithstanding continuous and fierce attacks by the enemy.

Enemy Presses Back Cavalry. "In the region of Anirea and Chudachic, 12 versts south of the confluence of the Rivers Putna and Zabala, the enemy pressed back our advanced cavalry detachments and occupied the above villages. Our troops during the night took up new positions which had been prepared beforehand.

"In Dobruja, our detachments withdrew to their original positions. Regarding the operations in the valley of the River Slonik, it is now reported that by our counter-attacks we took prisoner three officers and more than 200 men."

The Berlin statement as to the Rumanian front, as received here, follows:

"Front of Archduke Joseph: South of the Trotus Valley the much-disputed Mount Faltauan ridge of heights came into German possession thru a vigorous attack.

"Along the valleys leading from the Berek mountains to the Sereth our allies threw the enemy further back. Our troops stormed at the point of the bayonet several height positions on both sides of the Oltuz Valley. Soveya in the Susita Valley, was taken. Russian and Rumanian advances were repulsed. Three hundred prisoners were brought in.

"Army group of Field Marshal von Mackensen: The ninth army is sharply pressing the enemy, and detaching a year guards has forced the Russians to retreat further.

"From the west and south German and Austro-Hungarian troops are approaching the bridgehead positions near Fokshani and Fudendi. More than 1,300 prisoners and much war material remained in the hands of the indefatigable pursuers. The entire justice of their cause. Wily Teuton Tactics Have Entirely Failed

Dutch Newspaper's Comment Strongly Favorable to Entente Allies.

Allies' Move Clever

It is Now Germany's Duty to Disclose Her Conditions.

London, Jan. 2.-Commenting on the entente's reply to the German peace proposal The Telegraph, according to a Reuter Amsterdam despatch, says: "Germany's manoeuvre to divide her enemies has completely failed. The entente's note bears witness to unanimity and solidarity only possible on the basis of the holiest belief in the justice of their cause. The entire neutral world, with President Wilson at its head, must now admit that it is impossible for the entente to enter into negotiations with Germany while she refuses to unconditionally repair the injustice of her invasion of Belgium."

The Tids says: "The German calculation that public opinion in the neutral states would turn in favor of the central powers as a result of the German overtures appears likely to prove false owing to the clever tactics of the allies. The contention of the German press, however, that the entente does not want peace, is incorrect. It is impossible to express an opinion of

German Peace Conditions, which nobody knows. The burden of responsibility has shifted: it is now Germany's duty to disclose her conditions.

Killed in Detroit.

Belleville, Jan. 2.-Ralph Thompson, 25 years of age, who was born in this city and was for some time an employe of the postoffice, was on New Year's Day found dead in Detroit, evidently having been struck by a trolley car. He had for the past two years been working in Detroit. An inquest is being held.

Hungary Will Fight Count Tisza Asserts

Premier Deludes People by Talking of Revolt Among Allies.

Allied Aviators Make Numerous Air Raids

British and French Machines Shoot Down Nine Hundred-Foe Machines.

London, Jan. 2.-Reuter's Amsterdam correspondent sends the following despatch received from Budapest: "Count Stephen Tisza, the Hungarian premier, addressed the members of the government party, confessed that a mistake had been made by assuming that Rumania would not attempt to invade Transylvania."

"Alluding to peace, Count Tisza said: 'If our enemies insist on continuing the absolutely purposeless slaughter we shall continue hostilities either until we succeed in convincing them of the uselessness and hopelessness of the war, or until the impulse of self-preservation induces the nations which are being sent to slaughter to turn against their governments and make an end to the war.'

Vienna Papers Call Peace Reply Arrogant

Say Presumptuous Demands of Allies Must Be Rejected.

London, Jan. 2.-A despatch to Reuter's from Amsterdam says the Vienna newspaper comment on the entente's reply to Germany's peace proposal describes it as arrogant, and declares that the presumptuous demands for explanation, reparation and guarantees must be rejected, because the central powers have nothing to expiate and nothing to guarantee. They add that "the blood which is still to flow will be on the head of the entente."

Oldest Oddfellow Dies.

He Was Last Charter Member of the Original Toronto Lodge.

On Monday, Jan. 1, at the General Hospital, Mr. Lipman Walters died aged 88 years. Mr. Walters was the oldest Oddfellow in Toronto and one of the oldest in Canada.

On Jan. 14, 1868, he and five others were charter members of Canada Lodge No. 43, the oldest lodge in Toronto, and he is the last of the five. He has held continuous membership for over 60 years, having first joined in Philadelphia. He was always an active man and on the 18th of December he fell on the sidewalk and broke his arm; his injuries resulted in his death.
