Government, Hydro and Mackenzie Interests at Last Come to Understanding for Supply of 15,000 Horsepower—Question of Price Left to Single Arbitrator.

The power shortage in Ontario has at last been relieved by an under-standing arrived at yesterday between the government, the Hydro-Electric Power Commission and the Mackenzie interests. Commencing Sunday night, some 15,000 horse-power will be furnished to the Hydro by the Electrical Development Company. The question of price, which has been a barrier to an earlier settlement, will, by the consent of all three parties, be referred to Prigadier-General Mitchell, of the engineering faculty of Toronto University. This settlement of the power ques-tion was only arrived at after weeks of negotiations. At one time the different interests seemed to be as far
