## GOING INTO WINTER QUARTERS.

### Troops Along the Shabke River Make No Progress - Daily Artillery Fire Only Sign of Life.

London, Nov. 12.—Along the Shabke River both armies are inert. The artillery on each side devote a part of each day to shelling the opposing trenches. But apparently this is only perfunctory. Neither army shows a disposition to attack.

It is the belief here that Kuropatkin will remain on the defensive, and that Oyama, while unquestionably strong enough to attack, will not make a move until Port Arthur is in Japanese hands. Then Nogai's army of at least 80,000 men will be released. The rail way from Port Arthur to Yantai can transport Nogai's army to the front quickly, and thus give Oyama an overwhelming force.

**War Daily More Unpopular.**

In the meantime, while news from Port Arthur is eagerly awaited, attention is increasingly centered in the internal condition of Russia, where the effects of the war are being severely felt among the poorer classes. Factory railway systems have been shut down. The railways are in a disordered state. Millions of tons of grain are rotting and remain so until spring, till when the cultivators will be deprived of the price of their produce.

**Mobilization at Standstill.**

Russia's mobilization machinery is moving so slowly that it is impossible to say it is absolutely at a standstill. As the calls on the reservists extend further among the peasantry and artisans the popular hatred of the war grows. Yet this same hatred of the war, which has left divisions in the ranks, should have been completed last June searching still among the peasantry.

London, Nov. 12.—Among the hundreds of mayors who have been elected this week is one who attracted considerable attention by a singular offer. The Mayor of Huddersfield, in returning thanks for his election, said his desire was especially to have babies in his community.

He declared he would give the parents of every baby born in his city in the last six months and one year, together with a card bearing simple, homely directions for the welfare of the child. He hoped the offer would arouse in a certain measure attention to the question of infant mortality upon which the public concern.

Quelph, Nov. 12.—(Special.)—The Conservatives of South Wellington met here in convention this afternoon and tendered Joseph P. Downey, M.L.A., the nomination. No other name was suggested, and Mr. Downey was unanimously chosen by open vote. It was a large and representative gathering, and the reception tendered Mr. Downey was a distinct manifestation that his representation of the riding in the Ontario legislature during the last two sessions had been a success.
