

#### School Children Out on Strike

Owing to Insults to Hebrew Race Huge Sum to Be Spent on Army J. M. Harris, Thought to Be Conby Lady Teacher, Two Hundred Pupils Quit.

MONTREAL, March 1 .- Pending an investigation into the insults which are alleged to have been offered the Hebrew race by a lady teacher at the Aberdeen School, 200 pupils of that institution who went out on strike will return to their desks on Monday morning. There were several conferences yesterday among Hebrew leaders, and as a result it is likely that the trouble will receive an airing before the school commission. Principal Cockfield of Aberdeen School, it is said, will ask the expulsion of some of the strike leaders.

The striking children lined the sidewalks near the school yesterday and cheered lustily. A solitary foot policeman and one mounted officer paraded up and down the road trying to disperse the crowd, but as soon as the youthful strikers were moved from one part of the square they gathered at another. #### Quarter of Billion For German Military

and Building Forts on Eastern Frontier.

BERLIN, March 1 .- According to The Lokal Anzeiger the new German military bill involves an expenditure of nearly a billian marks (about \$250,-000,000), spread over three or four years, and thereafter there will be an annual increase in the army budget of from 200,000.000 to 220,000,000 marks. The newspaper says a large part of the billion marks will be devoted to building forts on the eastern frontier, and that 150,000,000 marks will be used for new barracks. The bundesrath has not yet taken up the question of raising the necessary revenues.
