**FIVE MONTHS JAIL FOR GETTING LIQUOR FOR AN INDIAN**

**Kate Berrigan Sent in Today—Eva Morrell for Six Months—Sheeley Fined \$48**

In the police court this morning Kate Berrigan was fined \$100 on a charge of supplying liquor to James Francis, an Indian.

Robert Gorman and James Ruthledge were fined \$4 each for drunkenness, while the amount was increased to \$8 in the cases of Edward McHugh and James Harrington.

James Francis, the Indian, was fined \$8 on a charge of being drunk and \$20 on a charge of assaulting Eva Morrell in her house in Sheffield street. The Morrell woman exhibited several bruises and cuts on her face, where she had been beaten.

Kate Berrigan was charged with supplying the Indian with liquor, but pleaded not guilty. Policeman Marshall told of arresting Francis in Sheffield street last night.

Eva Morrell said that Kate Berrigan came into her house last night to get her to write a letter for her. Francis came in a little later, and gave Berrigan a half dollar to procure a "square" of gin. This she willingly did and all three had a drink.

Francis said, in answer to Judge Ritchie that he could read and write only in his native language. He was a Christianized Indian, however, and sometimes went to church. He said that he was a member of the Eva Morrell's house and gave her 50 cents to get some firewater. Sad to relate, however, he took too much and he found himself in the lock-up.

His honor said that the full penalty for supplying liquor to an Indian was \$300. In this case he would impose a fine of \$100 or five months in jail.

The woman wept bitterly when the sentence was announced, and when heard for sometime.

The troubles of Eva Morrell were not yet over. She was now charged with keeping a disorderly and lawless house at the corner of Sheffield and Carmarthen streets. Policeman Marshall said the character of the house was of a very shady nature and the woman possessed an unsavory reputation.

James Francis, who was the chief witness, said that what the policeman had stated was true.

The woman denied the charge, but she was sent to jail for six months, and on going below assisted her friend, Miss Berrigan in a series of long and continued shrieks.

Wm. Sheeley, who was remanded a few days ago on a charge of drunkenness, profanity, and violence, resisting I. C. R. Policeman Collins, was fined \$48 or six months imprisonment this morning.

Charles Rogers and Noble Clark, charged with being drunk in a row in Main street last week, were brought into court, but as Mr. MacDonald, pursuer on the steamer Simons was necessary as a witness, the men were remanded until four o'clock this afternoon. J. King Kelley appeared for the prisoners.

Under an old charter, St. John has absolute control of the harbor, and can fix the revenues from time to time.

**MRS. MASSEY, WIFE OF BANK OF MONTREAL MANAGER, DEAD**

Frederick, N. B., Nov. 10.—(Special)—After an illness of less than twenty-four hours, Mrs. Massey, wife of George Massey, manager of the Bank of Montreal here, passed away at the Victoria Hospital this morning as the result of an operation for an internal trouble. It seems that a few weeks ago she swallowed a small bone while eating and, although little was thought of the matter at the time, severe pains which she later experienced, were attributed to that cause. Yesterday afternoon her condition became so serious that she was removed to the hospital, where Dr. Atherton, Bidges and Holter performed an operation. Although successful, it did not have the desired effect and she died this morning.

Mrs. Massey came here with her husband from Chatham, Ont., two years ago and had made many friends to whom the news of her death was a most painful shock. She was formerly Miss Birrell and was a native of London, Ont., where her sister, the wife of Hon. Charles Hymans, now resides. Besides her husband, she leaves one son, William, and three daughters—Misses Marjorie, Muriel and Doris, of this city. It is understood the body will be interred here.

**ANALYSIS SHOWS CITY WATER PURE**

**Dr. Warwick Found no Trace of Typhoid Bacillus or Anything Else Harmful**

The report of Dr. William Warwick, who was engaged to make an analysis of the city's water supply, has been handed to Alderman Kelley, who, with Ald. Christie, was appointed a committee to deal with the matter.

The analysis was ordered so that it might be learned whether the water was in any way responsible for the recent outbreak of typhoid fever in the city.

Dr. Warwick collected samples of water from the faucets in various parts of the city and made a thorough examination, and his report states that he found no trace of typhoid bacillus or any other foreign substance of an injurious nature. The water was found to be perfectly pure and clean. This report, it is believed, will set at rest any feeling there may have been that the water was contaminated.

Ald. Kelley says he considers the report highly satisfactory, as it shows that the city's supply of water is above reproach.

This report gives emphasis to what Dr. J. P. McInerney, Dr. G. A. R. Adly and others have said that the typhoid was most likely due to bad sanitation and to filth.
