FOUR WILL DIE MANY INJURED Railway Wreck on Baltimore and Ohio Results Fatally Wheeling, W. Va., Sept. 28—Eight men were killed, four fatally injured and seventeen more or less seriously hurt late today when the Chicago and Wheeling express Spring Chickens comic opera, which was to have played at Wheeling this afternoon and evening. All the members of the company escaped serious injury, except Alfred Dolby, the musical director. It was found necessary to amputate his right arm, thus ending his career in his profession. He was riding in the smoker, and was found with a heavy timber tightly binding him by the arms. The property damage will amount to about \$60,000. A curious feature of the wreck is that the baggage car and the smoker were the only cars on the passenger train damaged.
