only surmise, and the most reasonable of my surmises is that millions of years ago they were imbedded in glaciers, perhaps of the sides of the Pickwockets or the moun tains of Greenland, and dropped here as those great bodies of ice melted as they journeyed with the currents into a warm-

About midsummer I have always observed on these boulders tiny spots of greyish white, like drops of paint, which gradually enlarged, until some of them have became about a foot in diameter. They were imperceptible to the touch—apparently nothing but a blotch of color. With the aid of a magnifying glass I discovered that they were a species of lichen and that each spot was a magnificent flower, and at the same time a forest of trees and blooming shrubs, the tallest of which could not have been more than the hundreth part of an inch in height.

On this same elevation a family of ants established itself a long time ago. For more than twenty years I always visited my ants when I chanced to be in the neighborhood. My ants are busy people: they werk from daylight to daylight as if the fate of a whole world depended on their exertions, but when winter comes, like the wise people they are, they lie down in their beds and sleep till spring. One day last summer I inadvertently stepped on their fortress. Consternation ensued, like that experienced in San Francisco at the time of the earthquake, but everything has been restored to its normal condition: there are no grafters and no labor unions among my ants.


