and this can only be done by the active exertions of members to increase the efficiency of the Institute, and by every means in their power to promote its best interests. Upon the individual exertions of each, and the well directed efforts of all, will the future career of the Institute depend; and feeling confident that this will not be wanting, your Committee look forward to the change as one which will mark a new era in the history of the Institute, and the commencement of a career of prosperity and usefulness which even the most sanguine among us can hardly anticipate.
