### Bryan Scored Left and Right By Press

While Mr. Bryan may have some sympathizers in the United States, the press generally gives him cold comfort. The following are a few extracts:

New York Sun—He has chosen to make his leaving as unpleasant as his staying. He deserts the president at a moment of grave international complication. He deliberately does all that lies in his power to create a prejudice against the state to be sent to Germany Thursday, a note whose contents are still unknown to the public. His remarkably tender sense of duty makes him forget that he owes a duty to the United States.

Los Angeles Times—President Wilson is to be congratulated upon this breach in his cabinet. Secretary Bryan was the weakest point in his line, and now he can strengthen it. The inefficiency and ineptness of the secretary of state has been a reproach to the country and no doubt a source of mortification to the president.

New York World—Mr. Bryan's resignation, however unfortunate, cannot change the attitude of the country toward the president. Rather it will solidify public sentiment still more strongly behind Mr. Wilson.

Albany Press—It was the duty of Mr. Bryan at the present time to stand by the president just the same as it is the duty of every loyal American citizen to stand by President Wilson in this crisis.

Richmond (Va.) Times-Dispatch: It is Mr. Wilson, not Bryan, who strikes today the note to which the heart of the American people responds and with which it beats in general sympathy. The nation is with him. If here and there are dissenting voices they are drowned in the great surging chorus of national approval.

Indianapolis Star—Mr. Bryan is now free to pursue the prohibition propaganda from which he seems to expect so great returns. The president, it has long been suspected, has taken Mr. Bryan's measure and will doubtless be much relieved at this sudden release from an always awkward situation.

Pittsburgh Gazette-Times—The resignation of William Jennings Bryan as secretary of state is a good riddance. It is a great relief to the people of the United States and President Wilson. It puts Mr. Bryan just where he belongs.

Buffalo Morning Express—Mr. Bryan resigned as secretary of state yesterday. The Wilson administration is to be congratulated. The people of the United States are to be congratulated.

Rocky Mountain News—He was a failure as secretary of state and during his term lost prestige throughout the nation. And as Mr. Bryan receded the president grew in strength with the people and congress.

The Philadelphia Ledger—In a crisis like this Mr. Bryan's pathetic inadequacy is only too apparent. It would be at once unkind and superfluous to dwell upon his failure in his high office. No one but himself is to blame for it.

The Cincinnati Commercial Tribune—The retirement of William Jennings Bryan from the state department at Washington removes at a peculiarly critical time a serious menace to the good name and the welfare of the nation.

Boston Advertiser—The announcement of the withdrawal of William Jennings Bryan from the cabinet will, we feel sure, be received with profound satisfaction by most Americans.

Philadelphia Inquirer—And so Mr. Bryan is to go at last. That he has resigned is not at all strange. What is singular is that he could have remained as long as he had.

Boston Globe—Candor obliges us to state that Mr. Bryan's whole life has been such as would make him unfit by training and temperament for his position in this crisis of world affairs.

Salt Lake Tribune—Even those who were the faithful friends and admirers of the Nebraska statesman felt that his extreme views on several issues made him a crippling team-mate for the president.

The Salt Lake Herald-Republic—Mr. Bryan's retirement from the state department and from President Wilson's circle of official advisers is profoundly relieving.

The Arizona Republican—For what, if any, department of statecraft Mr. Bryan is fitted no one can say, but he quickly demonstrated that he was entirely unfitted to be at the head of foreign affairs.
